Fall Home Prep

The passing of the Labor Day Holiday for many signifies the end of summer: The kids are back in school, leaves are just starting to turn color, and there's that lovely "crispness" in the air. As those summer vacations fade to pleasant memories you may want to take a few minutes and work on that Fall Home checklist.

Here are the top five things you should do to get your home ready for winter:

REPLACE THE FURNACE FILTER.

Indoor air quality is especially important during Fall and Winter, considering we will be closing the windows and increasingly recirculating indoor air.

COVER THE HOSE BIBS.

They call them "hose bibs," but they're actually the outdoor faucets around your home. It's still a little early, but better to be early than late — no one wants to call the plumber to fix freezing pipes.

REPLACE THE BATTERIES IN YOUR SMOKE DETECTORS AND THERMOSTAT.

It's a good routine, every Labor Day and Memorial Day replace the batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. And, while you're at it you may as well replace them in your thermostat as well. (Some people go as far as replacing all the batteries in their TV remotes.)

MAKE SURE YOUR HOME'S EXTERIOR MEETS THE GRADE.

Walk around your home and make sure the soil is graded away from the building. Ensure no dirt is touching the exterior wood walls, and prune trees and shrubs so they're not touching your siding or roof.

Get a street tree planted at your home with Friends of Trees!

Local non-profit Friends of Trees, in partnership with Clark County, is hosting a neighborhood tree planting in NE Hazel Dell and Sherwood for the first time ever on December 8th and we want to invite you to participate by getting a street tree (or several) for your home!

Interested households can get street trees planted (for only \$35 per tree) at their home on the 8th. Street trees are trees planted along the street/curb, whether or not there is a sidewalk. Friends of Trees handles all the logistics at no additional cost: completing the street tree inspections, submitting utility locates, digging the

holes, delivering the trees, AND helping plant the trees. If the tree cost is a barrier, we will even work with you to reduce or waive the fee.

Friends of Trees plantings are a great way to get outside, plant trees in your neighborhood, get to know your neighbors, and most important, have fun. Bigger is Better

Bigger is better when it comes to recycling. According to Waste Connections the bigger the recycled item is the more likely it will make it all the way thru the recycle process and equipment. Items that are smaller than your fist will most likely fall out of the automatic sorting equipment. Any mixed paper if torn in to smaller pieces will most likely fall out of the automatic sorting equipment and land on the floor where it is classified as trash. Large pieces of cardboard should be cut down to a size that will fit inside your blue or pink recycle bin. Also dry cardboard is more valuable than wet cardboard. All glass items should always be placed in their separate collection bin. Broken glass is a hazard and will get caught in the sorting equipment or just fall out of the equipment. Always remember if you question if something is recyclable or not it is best to just throw it out rather than contaminate the good recyclables. Medicare Scams

The Federal Government is in the process of issuing new Medicare cards. Your new card will have a New Medicare Number that's unique to you, instead of your Social Security Number. This will help protect your identity. Scam artists are already at

work trying to steal your information. What should you do if someone calls and asks for your information, for money, or threatens to cancel your health benefits if you don't share your personal information? Hang up! It's a scam. Scam artists may try to steal your personal information by calling you and asking for your current Medicare Number to get your new Medicare card. Medicare will never call uninvited and ask you to give personal information or money to get your new Medicare Number or card. If you get a suspicious call like this, call 1-800-633-4227. For more information go to www.medicare.gov

Remember: Your new Medicare card will automatically come to you in the mail. You don't need to do anything, as long as your address is up-to-date with the Social Security Administration. School Bus Stop Rules

A new school year has started and many of our children will be riding the busses to and from school. The Washington State Patrol (WSP) would like you to take a few minutes to refresh your knowledge on how to drive safely around school busses as they are picking up and dropping off our children.

The WSP has posted a video discussing rules of the road and driving safety around the school busses; when you have to stop and when may proceed. The School Bus Stop Rules video is posted at <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=moK9MZVSIQY&feature=plcp>

The law states the \$419 fine for failure to stop for a school bus cannot be reduced, suspended, or waived. If you get a ticket for failure to stop for a school bus you will pay the full amount.

We cannot stress enough how important it is to practice safe driving, especially when children are present.

REPORT A ROAD CONCERN

For problems that require immediate response, please call (360) 397-2446.

For issues that don't require immediate attention, such as a pothole or vegetation issue, filling out an online maintenance request is an excellent way to report a road or park concern.

For more pressing problems, please call (360) 397-2446. County staff tends to be extremely busy during storms and may not have time to

regularly check online submissions, so a phone call is the best way to report a problem that needs immediate attention.

County staff typically receives these electronic maintenance requests from 6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays.

For urgent issues after hours or on weekends and holidays, please call (360) 397-2446 to reach an answering service, which can dispatch a county crew if necessary.

To report off-leash or aggressive dogs in county parks, call Clark County Animal Control, (360) 397-2488, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. For animal issues outside of business hours, call 311.

For life-threatening emergencies, always call 911 immediately.

Federal Marijuana Laws

If you live in a state that legalized medical or recreational marijuana use, it may come as an unpleasant surprise to learn that you are still committing a federal crime by possessing, buying, or selling marijuana. Even possession of marijuana on federal land or property is illegal. The problem is, despite the liberalization of state laws across the country, federal law still treats marijuana as a controlled substance, just like cocaine or heroin.

This conflict between state and federal law creates a situation where you can be charged with a federal crime for activities that are allowed by your home state. And your state laws won't be a defense in federal court. There are also several ways that federal marijuana laws can affect everyday life decisions, from where you bank to where you live.

Understanding Federal Marijuana Laws

Since the 1930s, federal law has declared the use, sale or distribution of

marijuana illegal. Current federal drug laws are contained in the Controlled Substances Act (CSA). The CSA classifies and regulates illegal drugs, and places listed drugs on a schedule according to their medicinal value and potential for abuse.

Under the CSA, marijuana is a Schedule I controlled substance. This designation is reserved for drugs that have a high potential for abuse, lack any medical value and can't be safely prescribed. Anyone growing, marketing or distributing marijuana is likely violating multiple federal laws.

You can run into problems with the CSA even if you are not directly involved with the marijuana industry. If you provide services to a business that operates under state marijuana laws, you may also be violating federal law, and subject to prosecution. So if you run a janitorial services and have a client that operates a dispensary, you may be profiting from illegal drug trafficking.

The CSA also makes it unlawful to "knowingly open, lease, rent, maintain, or use property for the manufacturing, storing, or distribution of controlled substances." So landlords that have tenants involved in state-permitted marijuana industry may risk federal asset forfeiture or other criminal fines. Penalties for violating the CSA are not just targeting growers and distributors. Simple possession with no intent to distribute is a misdemeanor, punishable by up to one year in prison and a minimum fine of \$1,000. Individuals involved in marijuana businesses can receive up to five years in prison and fines up to \$250,000 for individuals and \$1 million.

There is currently a ceasefire in the federal war on medical marijuana. Since 2014, Congress has approved a budget amendment that prohibits the Department of Justice to use funds to prevent state from implementing their medical marijuana laws. Known as the Rohrabacher-Farr or CJS amendment, this piece of legislation must be acted on each year to keep it in place so its future is uncertain.

SENIORS AND LAW ENFORCEMENT TOGETHER – S.A.L.T.

What is S.A.L.T.? S.A.L.T. stands for Seniors And Law Enforcement Together. It is a cooperative effort of the Clark County Sheriff's Office, Camas Police Department, Vancouver Police Department, and the Senior Citizens of East Clark County.

What is S.A.L.T.'s purpose?

- To decrease crime and the "fear" of crime in order to raise livability for our seniors.
- To increase and improve senior crime prevention and education.
- To improve local law enforcement's knowledge of the crime prevention needs of seniors.
- To identify the concerns of local senior citizens.
- To improve senior victim assistance.
- To involve senior citizens in crime prevention and the educational efforts of S.A.L.T. and to raise awareness of the community of these special issues.

What does S.A.L.T. do? Monthly meetings featuring speakers on relevant topics such as Elder Abuse Awareness, Understanding Dementia, Senior Health & Fitness, Avoiding Scams, etc.

Currently there is an East Side and a West Side for the public's convenience in being able to reach the locations. However, any citizen may attend one or more meetings per month.

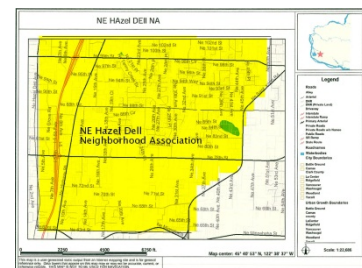
