Santa’s Posse needs your help!

Santa’s Posse is a partnership between the Clark County Sheriff’s Office and the local community, working together to collect and distribute toys and food to make a special Christmas holiday for less fortunate families.

In 1997, Santa's Posse was created as a way of contributing back to our community and to help families in need during the holiday season.

What started with delivery of food, gifts and personal care items to 43 families has now expanded to 1,000 families. In 2018, Santa's Posse will provide Christmas for more than 3,400 children in our community in an effort to increase positive contacts between law enforcement officers and families.

**Fraud Alerts** - Sign up for irregular or fraudulent activity alerts with your credit card accounts.

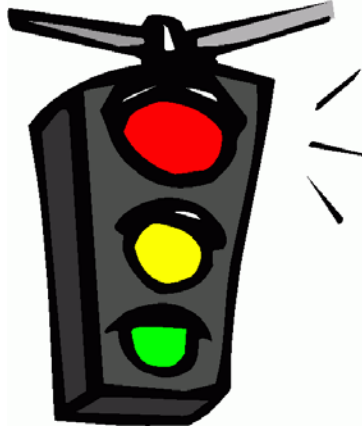
**Change your passwords regularly** - Create strong passwords using a combination of letters, numbers and symbols. Use different passwords for all the sites you use.

**Spot a Scam** - Fraudulent e-mails look as if they have come from legitimate organizations. Never respond to web sites asking for personal information. Don't click on links until you've confirmed the e-mail or texts are real.

We all have an opportunity to rid our community of this problem by following the suggested steps of **RECORD, REPORT and REMOVE**. Thank you for your help.

## Red Light Runners

With our fast pace, hurried life style often more drivers are running red traffic lights. Local and State law enforcement officials advise drivers to pause a moment at an intersection before proceeding when the traffic light turns green because of the prevalence of "Red Light" runners.



Running a Red Light is a moving traffic infraction and subject to a fine of \$130. In some cases even running a yellow light could result in a \$130 fine. Also along those lines, anyone failing to come to a complete stop at a Stop Sign (often referred to as a California Stop) can be charged with a moving violation and fined \$130. Always be mindful that the life you save maybe your own.

## Comic Corner - Sad News to Report

Please join us in remembering a great icon of the entertainment community. The Pillsbury Doughboy died yesterday of a yeast infection and trauma complication from repeated pokes in the belly. He was 71.

Doughboy was buried in a lightly greased coffin. Dozens of celebrities turned out to pay their respects, including Mrs. Butterworth, Hungry Jack, the California Raisins, Betty Crocker, the Hostess Twinkies, and Captain Crunch. The grave site was piled high with flours.

Aunt Jemima delivered the eulogy and lovingly described Doughboy as a

man who never knew how much he was kneaded. Doughboy rose quickly in show business, but his later life was filled with turnovers. He was not considered a very smart cookie, wasting much of his dough on half-baked schemes. Despite being a little flaky at times, he still was a crusty old man and was considered a positive roll model for millions.



Doughboy is survived by his wife Play Dough, three children: John Dough, Jane Dough and Dosey Dough, plus they had one in the oven. He is also survived by his elderly father, Pop Tart.

The funeral was held at 3:50 for about 20 minutes.

## Recycling Hints

Plastic bags or wrappers do NOT belong in the blue recycle roll carts. Neither do veggie trays or lids, plastic bubble packaging, or just about anything which is plastic (other than plastic bottles with a neck and cottage cheese/yogurt tubs). Plastic bags get caught in the sorting machine forcing it to be stopped and the plastic bags removed. This costs YOU money!

Please don't put your plastic bags in the blue roll cart.

Frozen food packaging does NOT belong in the blue recycle roll carts either.

Boxes for frozen or refrigerated foods are treated with a chemical named 'wet strength' which keeps the cardboard from disintegrating when it gets wet.

That chemical makes the cardboard extremely difficult to recycle, so put cold food packaging in the gray garbage roll cart.



Additionally Styrofoam (™) packaging and food containers do NOT belong in the blue recycle roll carts. Kleenex and paper towels do NOT belong there either.

### ***What DOES belong in the blue roll cart?***

Paper egg cartons, newspapers, aluminum cans, catalogues, junk mail, rinsed food cans, cardboard, plastic containers with a neck (please remove the lid and squish), magazines, phone books, paper bags, cereal boxes, milk cartons, empty aerosol cans (please remove the plastic nozzle), scrap metal, etc.

Glass goes in the old bin we used to use - the green one if you have a choice, but the brown or cream one is ok too.

Shredded paper can be put in the blue recycle roll cart but please first put it in a paper bag and staple the bag shut so the little fru-frus of paper don't escape.

You do not HAVE to set out your cart every service day-you may prefer to set it out only when it is full or mostly full.

### **Scouts plan to Recycle Christmas Trees**

Local Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts will be collecting and recycling Christmas

trees on Saturday, January 5th from 8 AM to 4 PM. Place your cut tree at the curb and mark it "FOR THE SCOUTS". A \$7.00 donation is requested. Trees will be chipped for mulch. Funds collected will be used for the cost of recycling and future Scout activities. Boy Scout Troops #479, 370 and Cub Scout Pack #370 will be collecting trees in the NE Hazel Dell area.

### **Thieves Are Getting Smarter**

Not all thieves are stupid. Here are a few examples of their scams.

1- Long-Term Parking: Someone left their car in long-term parking and it was broken in to. Thieves using the information on the car's registration in the glove compartment, drove to the owners home and robbed it. Best not to leave registration/insurance information in your car, nor your remote garage door opener.

2- GPS: Thieves often break in to cars that are parked at events such as a football game. They will steal your garage door opener and your GPS which is often prominently mounted on the dashboard. The thieves can use the GPS to guide them to your home and then use the remote garage door

opener to gain access to your home. They will know what time the game is scheduled to finish and so they will know how much time they have to rob your home. Something to consider if you have a GPS - don't put your home address in it. Put a nearby address (like a store or gas station) so you can still find your way home if you need to, but no one else would know where you live if your GPS is stolen.

3- Cell Phones: Let say a lady's handbag was stolen. Inside the bag was her cell phone, credit cards, wallet, etc. Later when she called her hubby, from a pay phone telling him what had happened, hubby says, " I received your text asking about our pin number and I've replied a little while ago. When they rushed to the bank, the bank staff told them all the money was withdrawn. The thief had actually used the stolen cell phone to text "hubby" in the contact list and got hold of the pin number.

### *Moral of the lesson:*

A- Do not disclose the relationship between you and the people in your contact list. Avoid using names like Home, Honey, Hubby, Sweetheart, Dad, Mom, etc.  
B- And very importantly, when sensitive info is being asked through texts, CONFIRM by calling back.  
C- Also when you're being texted by friends or family to meet them somewhere, be sure to call back to confirm that the message came from them. If you don't reach them, be very careful about going to places to meet "family and friends" who text you.

4- Purse In The Grocery Cart: A lady went grocery-shopping at a local mall and left her purse sitting in the children's seat of the cart while she reached something off a shelf. Her wallet was stolen and she reported it to the store personnel. After returning home, she received a phone call from Mall Security to say that they had her wallet and that although there was no money in it, it did still hold her personal papers. She immediately went to pick up her wallet, only to be told by Mall Security that they had not called her. By the time she returned home again, her house had been

broken into and burglarized. The thieves knew that by calling and saying they were Mall Security, they could lure her out of her house long enough for them to burglarize it.

Even if this does not pertain to you, please let your family and friends know so they don't get caught in a scam.

### Winter Safety Tips

#### How to avoid frozen water pipes

Clark Public Utilities reminds water customers to guard against freezing or bursting plumbing and pipes before temperatures plummet.

Disconnect garden hoses. Insulate outside faucets and water pipes in crawl spaces, basements and garages. Allow a trickle of water to drip from an indoor faucet during severely freezing nights. Remember that owners are responsible for plumbing on their private property. Never try to thaw a frozen pipe with an open flame.



### Winter driving tips

- Slow down and be cautious.
- Be seen! Use your headlights.
- Do not use cruise control.
- Leave extra room between you and the car in front of you.
- Slow down when approaching ramps, bridges or shady spots where black ice tends to accumulate.



### Snow removal on Clark County Roads and residential streets

Clark County is responsible for maintaining 2,665 lane miles, roughly the driving distance between Vancouver and Atlanta, and does not have the resources to clear every street. They focus on the busiest roads to keep people, goods and services moving. Property owners are responsible for maintaining access to driveways and parking lots.

### Emergency Responders always on Call and Ready

We all take for granted that the Police-Fire-Emergency Medical-Corrections-Public Works will always be on the job whatever the conditions. If and when a snow, ice or wind storm hits, many people take the opportunity to take an unscheduled holiday and stay home. But what about those essential services where "not going to work" is just not an option?

Local Search and Rescue (SAR) groups have a long history of putting their time and talents to work for more than just looking for lost souls. That's why your local SAR groups volunteer to transport doctors, lab tech's, nurses, cooks, custodians to and from area hospitals, all on their own dime and their own time. Who Better? After all you should see some of the terrain they traverse just to get to a remote SAR Base Camp. Snow or ice covered pavement might be considered an

improvement. Our Clark County Sheriff's Office Civilian Search and Rescue Team have logged countless hours making transport trips day and night thru out the county and adjoining areas.

At the end of the school year, Pen Pal Adults are required to attend the end of the year party where you will meet your student for the one and only time. You also bring a snack to share with your student to the party.

**Safe Kids Clark County**

Nearly 3,000 children per year are fatally injured at home. Safe Kids Clark County urges parents to childproof homes.

Approximately 2,700 children in the United States, ages 14 and under, die from accidental injuries in the home each year. Around 80 percent of these deaths were among children ages 4 and under. Most fatal injuries at home are caused by

fire, suffocation, drowning, choking, falls, poisoning or firearms discharged unintentionally.

Safe Kids Clark County urges parents and caregivers to check their homes for basic safety precautions. The first step in childproofing a home is to explore every room at a child's eye level. Literally get down on your hands and knees and crawl around. Anything that can fit through a standard 1½-inch toilet paper tube is a potential choking hazard. Of course, cleaning products, medications, alcohol, firearms and other potentially harmful products need to be stored out of reach and locked up.

Additional recommended safety precautions:

- Test your smoke alarms every month. Change the batteries at least once per year.
- Always supervise children while they're in the bathroom and follow other important safety guidelines.
- Install a self-closing and self-latching gate around the home swimming pool.
- Look at every room as your child would. Ask yourself what looks interesting and what can be reached.
- Always supervise young children while they're eating. To avoid choking, don't allow children under age 3 to eat small, round or hard foods, including hot dogs, hard candy, nuts, grapes and popcorn.
- Prevent serious falls. Keep furniture away from windows, install guards or stops on windows that are not emergency exits, install safety gates at the top and the bottom of stairs.

- Avoid exposing children to potential poisons. Lock up potential poisons out of children's reach.
- Install carbon monoxide detectors in the basement at least 15 feet from fossil-fuel burning appliances and every sleeping area. Be sure to test detectors every month.
- Keep emergency numbers by every telephone. Call 911 if a child is choking, collapses, can't breathe or is having a seizure. If you suspect a child has been poisoned, call 1-800-222-1222.
- Check your first aid kit to make sure it is fully stocked. Make sure babysitters know where to find first aid supplies and how to handle an emergency.
