

Comic Corner – Obituary

Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Common Sense, who has been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape. He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as: Knowing when to come in out of the rain; Why the early bird gets the worm; Life isn't always fair; And maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in His health began to charge). deteriorate rapidly when wellintentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches became businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims. Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for assault. Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to realize that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap, and was promptly awarded a huge settlement.

Common Sense was preceded in death, by his parents, Truth and Trust, by his wife, Discretion, by his daughter, Responsibility, and by his son, Reason. He is survived by his 5 stepbrothers; I Know My Rights; I Want It Now; Someone Else Is To Blame; I'm A Victim; Pay Me For Doing Nothing. Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone. If you still remember him, pass this on.

Adopt-A-Road Program

Clark County needs volunteers to pick up roadside litter as a way to beautify the county. In addition to litter pick up, Clark County may approve weed control and other roadside work.

To Adopt-A-Road, volunteers make a two-year commitment to pick up litter at least three times a year. The length of the adopted roadway may vary, but typically most sections are two miles in length.

The county will provide all supplies and equipment for clean-up events, as well as post signs recognizing volunteer groups along the adopted roadway sections,

Each group of volunteers must designate a group leader who will reserve clean up kits, ensure all necessary forms have been submitted, ensure everyone follows safety rules, complete and other group responsibilities.

Adopted roadways are county roads in unincorporated Clark County. The program does not apply to Federal and State Highways, city streets or private roads. Clark County already has identified about a dozen road sections suitable for adoption. Volunteers can also request to adopt other road sections. Public Works will assess the proposed road section for road shoulders, sight distances and other safety considerations before deciding whether to approve the request.

Breaking the Bread Code of **Freshness**

Americans each consume roughly 53 pounds of bread every year, and we want the freshest loaf whenever we buy it. But is there a simple way to spot it, other than squeezing, smelling or simply guessing?

Well, there is a simple visual code that can identify the freshest loafs on the store shelf. And it's contained in the twist ties or plastic clips around the top of the bread bag.

The Color Code of Freshness indicates on what day the bread was baked. The standard code is:

Blue ---- Monday Green --- Tuesday Red ----- Thursday White ---- Friday Yellow --- Saturday

An easy way to remember the code is to simply recall the alphabet. The colors run in alphabetical order. The system was set to help supermarkets and grocers identify which bread was new, which was getting old (so it could be put on sale), and which was out of date and needed to be removed from the shelves.

So as a general rule of thumb the next time you go to the store for your next loaf, make sure the color of the tag is the same as the day on which you are shopping. Note that the bakers got the day off on Wednesdays and Sundays. However, there are exceptions to the rule. Some bakers use only one color bread tag regardless of the day on which it was backed. They may simply contain a date stamp. In this case the date on the tag is the sell-by-date, not the date it was baked. If by chance the twist tie is always the same color, then you need to look for a date stamp on the bread bag.

Some bread makers may have their own color-coding. In that case it is best to contact the baker of your favorite loaf of bread and ask what their colorcode system is.

The bigger question is: "Where was I when this little bit of knowledge was handed out? I did not know that about bread!"

Repair Clark County

Formerly known as Repair Cafes, these are free community events where skilled 'fixers' volunteer to lend their skills to residence whom bring in their broken items for repair. The goal of these events is to keep stuff out of the landfill, conserve resources, save money and share skills throughout the community.

Bring your clothing, small home appliances, bicycles, electronics, jewelry, or tool/knives that need sharpening and fixers will try to repair them or help you fix them! Attendees may bring one item each and must be present during the repair. If multiple items are brought, the attendee will need to re-enter the line for their additional item after one repair is completed.

Attendees are encouraged to bring replacement parts (i.e. cords, zippers) specific to their broken item for fixers to use in the repair.

Experienced fixers will try to repair or mend your items and can sometimes teach you how to fix them. Please only bring items small enough to be easily carried by one person, and do not bring any items that are leaking, dangerous, dirty or have a strong odor. There are no guarantees an item can be fixed, or attempting to fix it won't break it even more, but fixers will be available to diagnose problems and offer their best, unbiased advice. Volunteers will provide free diagnosis and repair skills, and replacement parts may be available for sale at a low cost (i.e. cords, spark plugs).

volunteer orientation to ensure a safe and enjoyable event.

PET LICENSING

Licensed pets have benefits:

- They are more likely to quickly be reunited with their owners.
- They receive longer care periods at shelters.
- They are transferred to an emergency medical care facility if found with an injury.

In Clark County pet license applications are required for all cats, dogs and wild or exotic pets older than eight weeks. Once the pet turns six months you will be sent a notice to pay a licensing fee.

Applications and forms are online for pet license applications for all pets atwww.clark.wa.gov then click on SERVICES and select ANIMALS AND PETS.

Fees

Fees are required for pets older than six months. They are valid for 12 months.

Cats: Fertile - \$40; Altered - \$20

Dogs: Fertile - \$50; Altered - \$25

Wild animal - \$100

Low-income assistance - Pet license fee assistance is available for households that have limited incomes and are located in unincorporated Clark County or the city of Vancouver. Only one dog and one cat per household may qualify. Pets must be spayed or neutered.

Fines - The fine for having an unlicensed dog or cat in unincorporated Clark County and the cities of Vancouver and Yacolt is \$100 per animal. If an owner who receives a citation licenses the animal within 10 business days, the fine will be reduced by half. A second fine will cost \$200 and a third will cost \$400. Failure to pay a fine could create a lien against the owner's property.

Where to purchase a pet license:

Licensing agents may charge a fee of up to \$5 per license.

Mandatory Boater Education

Weather you cruise, sail, kayak, fish or do yoga on a standup paddle board, you need to know the laws and basics of boating safety.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 78 in collaboration with Clark County Marine Patrol and the United States Power Squadron offers an interactive class to meet the needs of both Washington and Oregon residents to obtain the required Boater's Education Card. Completing the class can also reduce the cost of boat insurance. The *About Boating Safety* class provides adults and children 12 and older a day of hands-on learning.

Classes are held the fourth Saturday of every month at the Clark County Operations Center (community room - 4th building on the left - B-1) located at 4700 NE 78th Street 98665. Class time is 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM.

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Traffic Safety

On July 23, 2017 Washington State's new Distracted Driving Law went into effect. This new law had additional elements that the previous law did not have and increased penalties.

- * No Hand-held Cell Phone Use
- Drivers may not use hand-held cell phones while they are driving, stopped in traffic, or at a stop light. This includes tablets, laptops, games, or other hand-held electronic devices.
- Drivers may not watch a video while they drive.
- This does not apply if a driver is contacting emergency services.
- Drivers can use hand-held devices when they are parked or out-of-theflow of traffic.
- * Hands-free Use Is Allowed
- Hands-free use , such as Blue Tooth, is allowed as is a single touch to start function. Start GPS or music before you drive.
- * Dangerously Distracted
- You can also get a \$99 ticket for other types of distractions such as grooming, smoking, eating, or reading if the activity interferes with safe driving and you are pulled over for another traffic offense.
- * What's Not Included
- Some things are not included in the law. Transit and emergency vehicles are exempt. Drivers of commercial vehicles must follow Federal Laws.
- Two-way radio, citizens band radio, or amateur radio equipment are not included in this law.
- * Costs

The first ticket will cost at least \$136. Get a ticket again within five years, and those tickets cost at least \$234. Unlike current law, which exempts cell phone violations from being reported to insurance companies, all violations will be available to insurance companies.

Research shows that phone conversations reduce visual attention. Pass your phone to the passenger, put it in the glove box, or turn it off before you drive.

School Zone Safety

- During the school year the Traffic Unit conducts School Zone speed enforcement. All school zones are active when lights are flashing or children are present so careful attention to speed is necessary to protect the safety of kids traveling to/from school. Remember the speed in a school zone is 20 MPH.



- * School Bus With The Stop Paddle Safety Tips
- Drivers need to stop in a two lane road no matter which way the bus is traveling.
- If the road is divided, the cars that are traveling in the same direction as the bus need to stop.
- If there is a two-way lane, cars in the turn lane need to stop as well as the vehicle that is going in the same direction as the bus.

Have you seen these weeds?

Japanese Knotweed is an invasive weed that is not native to Clark County. Since its inception in 2011, Clark Public Utilities' Eradication Nation has worked to stop its spread in Salmon Creek. Growing at a rate up to three inches per day this weed can grow up to 12 feet tall with stout bamboo-like hollow stems.



It can push through building foundations and driveways, dominate native vegetation, and destroy fish and wildlife habitat. In March and April, knotweed shoots look like asparagus. Keep an eye out for any fast-growing bamboo-like plants!

Japanese Knotweed spreads vegetatively from its roots, stems, and rhizomes that break off and are carried to other locations. A piece the size of your fingernail discarded into yard waste or floating down a stream can generate an entirely new infestation. Garlic mustard is another invasive

plant that displaces native vegetation.

Thousands of tiny seeds per plant make it easy for garlic mustard to spread over forest understory. Contact the Invasive Species Coordinator for more information on proper removal methods.

Join us today and learn to identify these invasive plants, report sightings, and participate as a volunteer! If you believe you have Japanese knotweed on your property, do not hesitate to contact Eradication Nation and schedule a site visit. With the help of a grant from the Centennial Clean Water Fund, we can provide **FREE control of Japanese knotweed on properties in the Salmon Creek watershed.**Email: knotweed@clarkpud.com or call 360-992-8787
