Santa's Posse is a partnership between the Clark County Sheriff's Office and the local community, working together to collect and distribute toys and food to make a special Christmas holiday for less fortunate families. In 1997, Santa's Posse was created as a way of contributing back to our community

and to help families in need during the holiday season.

What started with delivery of food, gifts and personal care items to 43 families has now expanded to 1,000 families. In 2019, Santa's Posse will provide Christmas for more than 3,400 children in our community in an effort to increase positive contacts between law enforcement officers and families.

Food boxes and gifts are delivered, prior to Christmas, by the Clark County Sheriff's Office; Rotary Clubs of Clark County; Fire District 6; KinderCare Learning Centers; and many community volunteers.

United States Census 2020

Everyone Counts.

Every 10 years, as required by the United States Constitution, the U.S. Census Bureau takes a complete count of the country's population. Every person living in the U.S. is expected to participate. The Census Bureau collects data for statistical purposes only and is required by law to protect your individual identity.

Having accurate, updated census information is vitally important. The information is used by Congress to distribute more than \$880 billion in federal health, education, and infrastructure funds to states, counties, and cities based on population. Census information is also used by Washington's bipartisan redistricting commission to draw new, equally populated legislative and congressional districts that reflect the population growth and shifts over the past decade.

The Census Bureau will begin collecting information in March 2020 and you can respond online, by mail, by phone, or with an in-person interview. You'll be asked to complete a questionnaire with a few basic facts about the people in your household. It's easy and confidential. Remember, everyone counts -- so when you receive the official questionnaire, complete it for each person in your household, or for the first time ever, you can respond ONLINE at <https://2020census.gov/en/ways-to-respond.html>

Habitat for Humanity ReStore

ReStore is a home improvement outlet. They sell new and reclaimed building materials, as well as new and use appliances, furniture, lighting fixtures, tools, exercise equipment, yard equipment and other home goods at deeply discounted prices. Inventory changes daily. Super outlet for Do-It-Yourselfers. Sales go to funding Habitat for Humanity's home-building projects right here in our own community. The Clark County ReStore is located at 10811 SE 2nd Street just off I-205. They are open 7 days a week. 10AM to 6PM (360-213-1313)

ReStore only accepts donations related to the Home. Visit their web site www.pdxrestore.org for donation guidelines. Drop off donations can be made at any time during store hours. For large items you can't fit in your car or truck they offer a donation pick-up service. There is a \$20 pick-up fee for residential donations in order to offset fuel and vehicle maintenance expenses.

For those who are remodeling and wish to donate they offer a Salvage Service that provides non-structural deconstruction services. They will take out usable items, such as sinks, toilets, cabinets, doors, etc., that you are replacing and bring them to the ReStore. They charge an affordable fee to cover their cost for this service.

The Clark County Habitat ReStore is also supporting the City of Vancouver's interest in sustainability. The advanced recycling center with volunteer support sort all metals, plastic and wood that would otherwise go to the landfill.

Household Battery Recycling

Waste Connections has recently announced new guidelines for recycling household batteries:

First, to avoid any spark from creating a fire hazard, they are advising to tape both ends of used batteries. The safest method is to fully cover the battery with tape, especially with button type batteries. Any tape should do the trick.

Second, save up your used batteries and place them in a sealed clear plastic bag.

Third, choose option A, B, or C to safely recycle batteries:

A- Several stores take back batteries. Check RecycleRight on the app or www.wcnorthwest.com to find a location convenient to you.

B- Bring taped batteries to any Clark County transfer station during their special household hazardous waste hours.

C- Place the plastic bag of taped batteries on top of your curbside recycle cart on recycle service day.

All household alkaline batteries, rechargeable and button batteries in every available size can be recycled up to 9V. Remember to tape all batteries to be recycled.

Why it is important to recycle batteries properly:

Safety: Batteries contain materials that are harmful to public health and environment. If batteries are not recycled properly, the heavy metals could leak out into the water and soil.

Do not put batteries in the garbage or recycle cart!

Fire Risk: Batteries can explode when heated or damaged. Batteries can start a fire when disposed of incorrectly. Proper disposal reduces this risk.

Resources: Batteries have valuable metals and minerals that can be used again if recycled properly.

Aria 150-Unit Apartment Complex decision appealed by Local Residents

Back on October 18th, C&L Homes received conditional approval by Clark County for the construction of 150-unit apartment complex consisting of 5 buildings and a clubhouse on 5 acres at 2703 NE 99th Street.

On November 1, 2019 several local residents (the petitioners) impacted by this project filed an appeal of the decision to allow C&L Homes to build the apartment complex.

The issues of appeal were the waiving of code minimum requirements concerning setbacks, environmental impacts, disturbances, stream crossing/containment and the safety,

quality of life, public wrong and harm to neighboring properties as well as impact to water supply and water quality to our community.

One of the primary concerns was the traffic impact of the development on NE 99th Street, NE 26th Avenue and NE 98th Street and the proximity of this development to nearby schools, Sarah J Anderson Elementary and Gaiser Middle Schools.

The Petitioners' Appeal is asking that the County reconsider the approval decision and conditions in light of the issues presented in their Appeal. The Petitioners are waiting to hear back from the County regarding this appeal.

Scouts plan to Recycle Christmas Trees

Local Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts will be collecting and recycling Christmas trees on Saturday, January 4th, 2020 from 8 AM to 4 PM. Place your cut tree at the curb and mark it "FOR THE SCOUTS". A \$10.00 donation is requested. Trees will be hauled and chipped for mulch. Funds collected will be used for the cost of recycling and future Scout activities. Boy Scout Troops #370, 479, and Cub Scout Pack #370 will be collecting trees in the NE Hazel Dell area.



Microplastics In Your Tea

When you sip a cup of gourmet tea, you could be swallowing billions of plastic particles. That is the findings of researchers at Canada's McGill

University who examined the "silken" tea bags used by many premium brands.

Unlike traditional paper tea bags, silken tea bags are made of plastic and are often pyramid-shaped, to give the tea leaves more room to expand. But when these tea bags are steeped in hot water, they quickly start to break down.

Scientists observed that a single silken bag can release about 13 to 16 micrograms of plastic per cup. Though that might not sound like much, it's thousands of times higher than the microplastic content of other foods.

Little research has been conducted on how microplastics affect human health, but this study suggests people use "tea bags or loose-leaf tea, which eliminates the need for this single-use plastic packaging."

Recycling Tips

Recycling does take a little effort, but the following rules below will help ensure your recycle truck driver collects the most recyclables in the best possible condition and you get the best benefit for your effort. The following explanations may help you understand the reason behind the rules.

Waste Connection does not use the recycle symbol or the numbers that identify plastic products. That number only tells you what type of plastic the product is made of. It does not tell you

if we have a vendor in our area to take that plastic product and recycle it. Just because you place items in the recycle bin does not mean they are recyclable.

Separate your recyclables. - Several years ago, Waste Connections switched to a one bin system for Glass only plus a blue roll cart for almost all other recyclable materials collected curbside.



Special pink recycle roll carts can be purchased in support of cancer survivors. The Recycle trucks have two sections, one for glass and one for most other materials. When the trucks return to the transfer station, where the actual sorting is done, they deposit each collection category in a different location.

Save yourself some time and energy by not putting your recyclables out unless your roll cart is at least three quarters full or more. Place your roll cart on the curb or road's edge with the hopper lid opening facing the street and place it at least three feet from other containers. This arrangement allows the automated truck to pick up your recycling cart without knocking over your garbage can or cart. Always remember the cart's wheels should be facing away from the street.

Plastic bags are recyclable but NOT IN YOUR CURBSIDE CART. Plastic bags tangle in the recycling sorting machinery and prohibit other more valuable commodities from being recycled. The machinery must be shut down periodically to hand cut out the plastic bags. Most grocery stores have a special collection container for plastic bags near their front doors. These plastics can be recycled into making products like plastic lumber or clothing for example.

Set Glass Only Bin and Mixed Recycling Cart at the curb by 6:30 AM on Day of Pick UP. The recycle truck drivers all start picking up recyclables by 6:30 AM. You cannot always count on the fact that your driver usually comes by at a certain time; for any number of reasons, the schedule can change. If midnight scavenging is not a problem you may want to set recycling cart out the night before your pick up is scheduled. Again, save yourself some time and energy by only setting out your Glass and Recycle Bins when they are nearly full.

Cut Cardboard Down to fit inside your Recycling Roll Cart. Cardboard is much more marketable if it is dry. If it is inside the cart, it saves time for the recycling driver and allows him to service more homes in a day, keeping costs down.

Used Motor Oil or Antifreeze can only be recycled in a clear one-gallon plastic jug with a screw top lid. Place the jug of Motor Oil or Antifreeze near the cart --- they will be picked up on a space available basis. Please only use clear one-gallon plastic jugs with screw top lids; they fit snugly in a special space on the truck so they won't spill. Also, please don't mix oil or antifreeze with water, brake fluid, or other liquids. Contaminated oil and antifreeze are not recyclable; they should be disposed of as household hazardous waste.

Place Scrap Metal (no larger than 24" and less than 35 pounds) Inside Your Recycle Cart. --- Scrap metal includes brass, aluminum, copper, and steel.

Place Household Batteries On Top Of Your Blue Recycle Cart. Please stock pile and then place all household batteries, including batteries from flashlights, rechargeable appliances, hearing aids, etc. in a clear, sealed plastic bag on top of your recycle cart. Also, please don't forget to tape off both ends of the batteries to avoid sparks.

Your smaller Glass Recycle Bin is for Glass Items Only. Do not place broken glass in this bin. Broken glass is trash.

Light bulbs are not recyclable in this bin. Also, please remove any metal or plastic lids or caps from glass containers.

Winter Safety Tips

How to avoid frozen water pipes

Clark Public Utilities reminds water customers to guard against freezing or bursting plumbing and pipes before temperatures plummet.

Disconnect garden hoses. Insulate outside faucets and water pipes in crawl spaces, basements and garages. Allow a trickle of water to drip from an indoor faucet during severely freezing nights. Remember that owners are responsible for plumbing on their private property. Never try to thaw a frozen pipe with an open flame.

Snow removal on Clark County Roads and residential streets

Clark County is responsible for maintaining 2,665 lane miles, roughly the driving distance between Vancouver and Atlanta, and does not have the resources to clear every street. We focus on the busiest roads to keep people, goods and services moving. Property owners are responsible for maintaining access to driveways and parking lots.

Winter driving tips

- Slow down and be cautious
• Be seen! Use your headlights
• Do not use cruise control
• Leave extra room between you and the car in front of you
• Slow down when approaching ramps, bridges or shady spots where black ice tends to accumulate

Home fire Prevention tips

- Never leave a cooking pot unattended on the stove
• Cover stovetop fires with a lid, don't pour water on it
• Unplug small appliances when not in use
• Do not store items in an oven or on the stovetop
• Do not put out your cigarettes in a potted plant - use a metal container filled with water or sand
• Clean clothes dryer lint traps often
• Don't run the clothes dryer while you're not at home

- Keep oily rags in a closed metal container
• Store gasoline/diesel fuel in liquid tight containers designed specifically for that purpose
• Empty fireplace ashes into a metal container and store outside, away from the house
• Don't leave a fireplace or stove fire burning while you are not at home
• Do not put blankets, furniture or other items within three feet of a heater
• Keep matches and lighters in a locked cabinet, away from children
• Only use candles when home and don't walk out of a room in which they are burning

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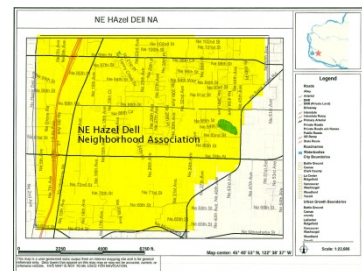
