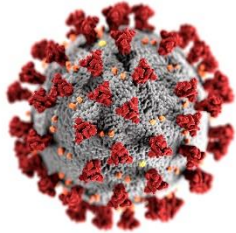

Interstate Bridge Closures September 2020
The Northbound span of the I-5 Interstate Bridge will close from September 12 thru 20, 2020, as crews replace mechanical parts that lift and lower the bridge. These are normal maintenance issues.

After the nine-day Northbound closure, travelers will experience a single-lane closure on the Southbound bridge span from September 21 thru 27 as construction crews remove equipment from the area and wrap up the project.

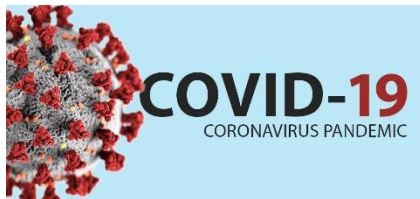

Census 2020 Update

The US Census Bureau has moved up the deadline to respond to the 2020 census from October 31st to September 30th. The one month adjustment in count time is mainly due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The Census Bureau needs extra time to prepare the December report to the President and Congress as required by law.

It is important to all communities that we get an accurate count of our present population. Full census participation is crucial to ensure equitable future funding for quality of life issues such as transportation, health insurance, hospitals, childcare, food assistance, education and other programs. Additionally, the census count determines the number of representatives each state has in Congress as well as the number of electoral votes that states have in Presidential elections.

Field offices and census takers are to wrap up their data collection by September 30th, 2020. The option to self-respond by phone, on-line or by mail to the census is September 30th as well. For more information go to www.2020census.gov

A "Why" Always Precedes A "BECAUSE"

1. WHY, Do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left?

BECAUSE ... When buttons were invented, they were very expensive and worn primarily by the rich. Since most people are right-handed, it is easier to push buttons on the right through holes on the left. Because wealthy women were dressed by maids, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right! And that's where women's buttons have remained since.

2. WHY, do ships and aircraft use 'mayday' as their call for help?

BECAUSE ... This comes from the French word m'aidez - meaning 'help me' - and is pronounced, approximately, 'mayday.'

3. WHY, are zero scores in tennis called 'love'?

BECAUSE ... In France, where tennis became popular, the round zero on the scoreboard looked like an egg and was called 'l'oeuf,' which is French for 'the egg.' When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans (naturally), mispronounced it 'love.'

4. WHY, do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses?

BECAUSE ... In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

5. WHY, is shifting responsibility to someone else called passing the buck'?

BECAUSE ... In card games, it was once customary to pass an item, called a buck, from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would 'pass the buck' to the next player.

6. WHY, do people clink their glasses before drinking a toast?

BECAUSE ... In earlier times it used to be common for someone to try to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to a guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host. Both men would drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would

only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.

7. WHY, are people in the public eye said to be 'in the limelight'?

BECAUSE ... Invented in 1825, limelight was used in lighthouses and theatres by burning a cylinder of lime which produced a brilliant light. In the theatre, a performer 'in the limelight' was the center of attention.

8. WHY, is someone who is feeling great 'on cloud nine'?

BECAUSE ... Types of clouds are numbered according to the altitudes they attain, with nine being the highest cloud. If someone is said to be on cloud nine, that person is floating well above worldly cares.

9. WHY, In golf, where did the term 'Caddie' come from?

BECAUSE ... When Mary Queen of Scots went to France as a young girl, Louis, King of France, learned that she loved the Scots game 'golf.' He had the first course outside of Scotland built for her enjoyment. To make sure she was properly chaperoned (and guarded) while she played, Louis hired cadets from a military school to accompany her. Mary liked this a lot and when she returned to Scotland (not a very good idea in the long run), she took the practice with her. In French, the word cadet is pronounced 'ca-day' and the Scots changed it into caddie.

10. WHY, are many coin collection jar banks shaped like a pigs?

BECAUSE ... Long ago, dishes and cookware in Europe were made of dense orange clay called 'pygg'. When people saved coins in jars made of this clay, the jars became known as 'pygg banks.' When an English potter misunderstood the word, he made a container that resembled a pig. And it caught on.

Signs 101

Most portable advertising signs you see around Clark County in the public right-of-way are not allowed. And almost every other advertising sign requires a permit. Some common signage found within Clark County is listed below.

This is not intended to be a comprehensive list of signs regulated by the county's sign ordinance but as a guide for which signs may or may not be allowed in your neighborhood. Signs that are allowed:

Political signs must be placed no closer than 10 feet from the edge of the road and must be removed within 15 days after election day.

Agricultural signs advertising agricultural activities or locations such as berry farms, trees, pumpkin patches, or farmer's markets.

Real Estate signs are allowed only on the property which is listed for sale.

New Subdivision or Development signage is allowed but limited to one large sign at the entrance.

Garage Sale signs shall be free standing and removed within twenty-four (24) hours of the completion of the sale. No sign shall be larger than two (2) feet by three (3) feet.



Please limit YARD SIGNS in our neighborhoods

Many of our neighborhoods here in Hazel Dell/Salmon Creek area have CC&Rs that were put in place at the time the subdivision was put in place.

When you buy a home in our community you receive a copy of the CC&Rs. These are put in place to keep your neighborhood livable and nice for all the home owners. An issue that was brought to my attention was the growing number of signs that are appearing in our neighborhoods. Here is the section from a CC&Rs for one of our neighborhoods in the Sherwood area.

"No sign of any kind shall be displayed to the public view on any lot except one professional sign of not more than one square foot, one sign of not more than five square feet advertising the property for sale or rent, or signs used by a builder to advertise the property during the construction and sale period. An appropriate entrance marker is excepted here from."

Please keep this in mind when placing signs in your yard. This will help keep our neighborhoods a comfortable and great place to live.



Coin Shortage

Believe it or not there is a national coin shortage due in part to the COVID-19 virus pandemic. Why is there a coin shortage?

1- The US Mint has been working at a limited capacity because of employee safety measures.

2- Large numbers of coins currently in circulation have been, essentially, locked in homes by coin collectors, piggy banks and/or loose change containers.

3- People have ordered more things on-line or have made in-person purchases using a credit card.

4- There is also an exchange problem: People are avoiding going to banks or coin kiosks. This roadblock in the flow of coins has led to a reduction in the number of coins that banks send to the Federal Reserve, which manages the distribution of coins around the country.

5- The Feds say this is no more than a "distribution of coin circulation" and they have resorted to the rationing of coins.

Sidewalk Maintenance and Repair



The Clark County Code states that all owners of property abutting upon any county road shall keep the public sidewalks immediately abutting their property in good order and repair. Each such owner shall be liable to the county for all losses to the county or recoveries from the county for damages to persons or property of others caused by such owner's failure to repair and keep in good order and reasonably safe condition all such sidewalks. The county may, at its discretion, through the director, notify such owner that repairs are necessary to put such sidewalk in good order and such owner shall, within the time specified by the director and under his supervision, complete such repairs. If the owner fails to make the required repairs, the county may repair the same and the owner shall be liable to the county for the costs thereof.

If You Were Born In 1900

For a small amount of perspective at this moment, imagine if you were born in 1900.

-On your 14th birthday, World War I starts, and ends on your 18th birthday. 22 million people perish in that war. Later in the year, a Spanish Flu epidemic hits the planet and runs until your 20th birthday. 50 million people die from it in those two years. Yes, 50 million.

-On your 29th birthday, the Great Depression begins. Unemployment hits 25%, the World GDP drops 27%. That runs until you are 33. The country nearly collapses along with the world economy.

-When you turn 39, World War II starts. You aren't even over the hill yet. And don't try to catch your breath. On your 41st birthday, the United States is fully pulled into WWII. Between your 39th and 45th birthday, 75 million people perish in the war.

On your 62nd birthday you have the Cuban missile Crisis, a tipping point in the Cold War. Life on our planet, as we know it, almost ended. When you turn 75, the Vietnam War finally ends.

Now think of everyone on the planet born in 1900. How did they endure all of that? When you were a kid in 1985 and didn't think your 85 year old grandparent understood how hard school was. And how mean that kid in your class was. Yet they survived through everything listed above. Perspective is an amazing art. Refined and enlightening as time goes on. Report Road Safety Issues ASAP

Both the City of Vancouver and Clark County's Public Works Departments need your help in keeping our communities safe by reporting road safety and graffiti concerns such as street signs blocked by over grown

If the over grown vegetation problem is too big for you to reasonably correct, please give Public Works a call. Use extreme caution whenever trying to remove an item from the roadway. Never attempt to remove any item from a freeway or busy roadway. For your safety Best to call 911.



Flattening the Kitten Curve

With the Covid-19 pandemic the Humane Society has postponed life saving spay/neuter surgeries for animals. Spay and neuter programs are one of the best tools we have to ensure that next summer's kitten season is kept to a manageable level. 1 cat + 1 cat = 8 kittens and 12 cats within a year. Cats can't count, they multiply.

As daunting as the problem of pet overpopulation is, it can be solved. Spaying and neutering are proven ways

Real IDs for Air Travel Update

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic the Federal Government has delayed the start date until OCTOBER 1st, 2021. At that time anyone wishing to board an airplane in the United States or access certain facilities controlled by the



Federal Government will be required to present a REAL ID compliant "Enhanced" Driver's License (EDL) or "Enhanced" ID CARD (EID).

After the 911 terrorist attacks Congress passed the Real ID Act in 2005 to bring better security to airports. The act established minimum security standards for state-issued Driver Licenses and ID Cards which can be used for access thru TSA airport security. Washington State already offers, but does not mandate, "Enhanced" Driver's Licenses or "Enhanced" ID Card that require proof of citizenship.

Many states have struggled for years to comply with the REAL ID enhanced security standards. In 2018 Washington State lawmakers passed a measure creating a two-tiered licensing system. The cost of a standard six-year driver's license is \$54; the "Enhanced " driver's licenses is \$78 for six-years. Residents have a choice of which license they want. Again, starting OCT. 1st, 2021, those with non-compliant licenses will need additional documentation - such as a passport, permanent resident card or military ID - to board domestic commercial flights.
