

Drive & Drop Food Drive – December 4th

The Walk & Knock Food Drive returns as Drive & Drop Food Drive again this year.

This Inter-service club is a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that has been serving Clark County for the past 37 years by soliciting charitable donations of food, supplies and money, which in turn are given to the Clark County food banks to provide food to

needy individuals within our community.

The members of this food drive include local Lions, Kiwanis, Rotary and Optimist clubs, members of the Clark County Amateur Radio Club, and adult leaders of Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America.

This year, we are asking the community to help in one of 3 different ways:

- 1. You can bring donations of nonperishable groceries or toiletries to one of eight drop-off sites throughout Clark County on Saturday, December 4th from 9AM to 2PM. You can find a map of these locations at: https://walkandknock.org
- Volunteers will unload donations from your vehicle to reduce risk of exposure to COVID-19.
- 3. You can also drop off nonperishable groceries or toiletries at designated drop-off barrels from December 1st through December 14th at all Riverview Community Bank, Les Schwab Tire Center and Cost Less Auto Parts locations.
- 4. You can also make a financial contribution. All the money collected goes directly to the Clark County Food Bank to help those in need. Recycling reminder: Light bulbs cannot be recycled at the curb. Collect them and deliver to Waste Connections facilities for proper recycling.

What to do if the Power Goes Out

- 1. If you lose power, first look outside to see if your neighbors still have power
- 2. If your neighbor's lights are on, check your electrical panel or breaker

box to rule out problems with electricity inside your home

- 3. Report the outage online or call PowerLine at 360-992-8000 to report this to Clark County Public Utilities. Remember, cordless landline phones won't work during a power outage
- 4. Immediately turn off all major electrical appliances, especially heating or cooking units, to prevent unsafe situations once power is restored. Leave a porch light and one inside light on.

Package Theft Prevention

Package theft is a crime that occurs throughout the year but can be



especially high during the holidays, as online shopping increases. The Vancouver Police Dept. wants to remind you to consider package theft

strategies when ordering gifts/products online. Packages delivered while you are away from home are easy and ideal targets for thieves. With the increased volume in home deliveries, thieves have more opportunities to steal your packages. Here are some crime prevention tips:

- 1- Pick up packages promptly after they are delivered.
- 2- Ask neighbors to receive and store your package deliveries when you are not at home.
- 3- Consider shipping the package to a relative that will be available to receive the package.

- 4- Require signature delivery to avoid the package being left unattended.
- 5- Utilize tracking services offered by the delivery company.
- 6- Request specific delivery times that are suitable to when you will be home.
- 7- Invest in a camera system to monitor your packages and home.
- 8- Send packages to secure delivery, holding, or pick-up locations.
- 9- Many parcel delivery companies offer secure locations for packages to be delivered and stored until you are available to pick items up. There are many companies and locations throughout Vancouver & Clark County that offer these services.

Ridwell Recycling

Finally there is a place that will collect your hard-to-recycle items. Ridwell, a Portland company, will provide you with bags for collection of your batteries, light bulbs, plastic film and clothing with a monthly bonus collection item. Door step collections are scheduled for every two weeks for a modest fee. Your stuff is recycled or reused by local partners dedicated to wasting less. Earth Facts

1- A year on Earth isn't 365 days. It's actually 365.2564 days. It's the extra .2564 day that creates the need for a leap year once every four years --- 2012, 2016, 2020, 2024.

- 2- Earth has one moon, but it has 2 coorbital satellites (asteroids called 3753 Cruithne and 2002AA29)
- 3- Roughly 30% of Earth's surface is land consisting of continents and islands.
- 4- The Earth travels at 67,000 mph around the sun.
- 5- The majority of Earth's fresh water is locked up in Antarctica.
- 6- The Earth is spinning on its axis. Depending on where you are standing on Earth, you could be spinning at 1,000 mph. People on the Equator move the fastest, while someone standing at the North or South Pole would be still.
- 7- Earth's moon actually has moonquakes. However, they mostly happen between the lunar surface and the moon's center.

Winter temps can drop to minus 100 degrees F (minus 73 degrees C) The lowest temp ever recorded came from Russia's Vostok weather station at a bonechilling minus 128.6 degrees F (minus 89.2 degrees C) on July 21, 1983. 10- Antarctica is actually considered a desert. Inner regions get 2 inches (50 ml) of precipitation a year (typically as

11- There is a tie for tallest mountain ... either Mount Everest or Mauna Kea. The summit of Mount Everest extends some 29,029 feet high above sea level. Volcanic mountain Mauna Kea when measured from its true base to summit is higher at 56,000 feet. However, its actual height above sea level is 13,680 feet but its flank extends 16,400 feet to the sea floor and its total mass has depressed the sea floor another 26,000 feet.

Origins of Phrases / Idioms

<u>Flying off the handle</u> - Meaning: To lose one's temper suddenly and unexpectedly. Origin: This metaphoric expression alludes to the loosened head of a hammer flying off after a

blow.

More than Carter has pills - Meaning: A huge number of something; an amount of something that is greater than one can count. Origin: A reference to a popular patented and heavy promoted medicine created in 1868 called "Carter's Little Liver Pills."

<u>Sleep tight</u> - Meaning: Used to tell someone to sleep well. Origin: One possible origin of this phrase dates back to when mattresses were supported by ropes; sleeping tight meant sleeping with the ropes pulled tight, which would provide a well-sprung bed.

Jump the shark - Meaning: It is pejorative, most commonly used in reference to unsuccessful gimmicks for promoting something. Origin: An episode of a TV comedy, Happy Days, with the gimmick or unlikely occurrence (Fonzie jumping a shark) desperately attempting to keep viewer's interest.
