Boomsnub-Airco Superfund Site

Soil and groundwater contamination at the Boomsnub-Airco Superfund Site resulted from disposal of chromeplating wastes, and solvents such as trichloroethylene (TCE), into dry wells. Chromium and volatile organic compounds (VOCs) seeped into the upper aquifer, and contaminated groundwater spread westward to form a cigar-shaped plume. As of 1995, the contaminated groundwater plume extended nearly a mile beneath the current Clark County recreational complex, the adjoining Church of God property, and at least as far west as the Bonneville Power Administration right-of-way.

Over the past twenty years, groundwater contamination has been greatly reduced through removal of the most contaminated soil, treatment in place of some contaminated soil, and continuous extraction and treatment of contaminated groundwater. The plume is now far less concentrated, and smaller, extending about a thousand feet from the source areas.

Extraction and treatment of contaminated groundwater, and associated monitoring of groundwater quality, is on-going and will continue until federal and state drinking water quality standards are met. As groundwater reaches these cleanup levels, infrastructure will be removed from the overlying properties.

Remedial action at the site is being performed by the Linde Corporation under U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) supervision. The governing legal agreement also requires Linde to reimburse EPA for its regulatory oversight costs.

EPA reviews Superfund sites every five years to assess cleanup progress and identify any additional actions that might be needed. The 2018 review is now underway and scheduled to be completed by September. As part of the review, EPA would like to hear from the community.

- 1- Talk with trusted family members, friends and professionals to help plan your or a loved one's future.
- 2- Be Cautious if something doesn't feel right, listen to your gut.
- 3- Stay Connected keep in touch with others regularly.
- 4- Engage in an activity that you or a loved one enjoys or try a new one together.
- 5- Volunteer with a social organization that works with seniors (like RSVP) or one that provides services for seniors (like Meals On Wheels).
- 6- Do A Wellness Check stop by or pick up the phone to see how a

neighbor, family member, friend, or even a stranger is doing.

- 7- Report it's the right thing to do & it's easy! If you suspect that you or someone you know is being mistreated, call Adult Protective Services at 877-363-4876.
- 8- Ask For Help feeling overwhelmed? There are great community resources to help seniors and caregivers. Try Respite Care to give yourself a break.
- 9- Know The Signs learn the signs for the different types of elder abuse and tips on how to safely intervene.
- 10- Get More Information contact your local area agency on aging or community organizations.

Who's At Risk?

Persons of any race, religion, ethnicity, culture, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, health status, gender identity, living arrangement, women, persons with cognitive impairment, and those who are socially isolated are at an even higher risk of abuse.

There Are 6 Different Types Of Elder Abuse:

- 1- Physical: hitting, shoving, kicking, pinching, slapping, force feeding, shaking, pushing
- 2- Sexual: look for bruising to outer arms, chest, mouth, genitals, abdomen, inner thighs, pelvic region
- 3- Psychological (Emotional): isolation, making threats, intimidation, humiliation, disrespect, shaming, and blaming
- 4- Neglect: malnutrition, pressure sores, dehydration, unexplained weight loss, infestation
- 5- Self-Neglect: hoarding, putting pets needs before self needs, refusing medical care, hazardous home conditions.

Abandoned Vehicles

Do you have vehicles in your neighborhood that litter the street and never seem to move? Well, according to Washington State Law any motor vehicle that is parked on any public street and has not moved in 3 days (72 hours) can be declared abandoned and subject to towing. It is recommended

that you call the Police non-emergency phone number "311" to report the vehicle's location; make; model and license plate ID code. In comparison vehicles parked within the city limits of Vancouver streets must be moved within one day (24 hours) before they can be reported as abandoned.

Shopping Cart Recovery

Following up on the story in the Jan/Feb 2018 issue on Grocery Cart Eyesores and recovery. Presently the best solution for those wayward carts is to call your local retailers and ask them to come and retrieve their carts. To that end, please look up phone numbers for major retailers in the area and ask to speak to a manager.

Package Theft Prevention

Package theft is a crime that occurs throughout the year but can be especially high during the holidays, as online shopping increases.



The Vancouver Police Department wants to remind you to consider package theft prevention strategies when ordering gifts online. Packages delivered while you are away from home are easy and ideal targets for thieves. With the increased volume in home deliveries, thieves have more opportunities to steal your packages.

Here are some crime prevention tips that may keep thieves from nabbing your deliveries:

- Pick up packages promptly after they have been delivered.
- Ask neighbors to receive and store your package deliveries when you are not home.
- Consider shipping the package to a relative that will be available to receive the package.
- Require signature delivery to avoid the package being left unattended.
- Utilize tracking services offered by the delivery company.

- Request specific delivery times that are suitable to when you will be home.
- Invest in a camera system to monitor your packages and home.
- Send packages to secure delivery, holding, or pick-up locations.
- Many parcel delivery companies offer secure locations for packages to be delivered and stored until you are available to pick items up. There are many companies and locations throughout Vancouver that offer these services.

If you see a package theft occurring, call 911.

Repair Café

Clark County Repair Cafés are free community events where skilled 'fixers' volunteer to lend their skills to residents who bring in their broken items for repair. The goal of the events is to keep stuff out of the landfill, conserve resources, save money and share skills throughout the community.

Bring your clothing, small home appliances, electronics, jewelry, or tools/knives that need sharpening, and fixers will try to repair them or help you fix them! Attendees may bring one item each and must be present during the repair. If multiple items are brought, the attendee will need to reenter the line for their additional item after one repair is completed.

Attendees are encouraged to bring replacement parts (i.e. cords, zippers) specific to their broken item for fixers to use in the repair.

Experienced fixers will try to repair or mend your items and can sometimes teach you how to fix them. Please only bring items small enough to be easily carried by one person, and do not bring any items that are leaking, dangerous, dirty or have a strong odor. There are no guarantees an item can be fixed, or that attempting to fix it won't break it even more, but fixers will be available to diagnose problems and offer their best, unbiased advice. Volunteers will provide free diagnosis and repair skills, and replacement parts may be available for sale at a low cost (i.e. cords, spark plugs).

Street Sweeping Schedules

Street sweeping makes a community look clean and tidy. It also keeps some dirt, debris and other contaminants from washing into storm drains, thereby reducing the harmful effects of polluted storm runoff. Clark County Public Works sweeps residential streets during fall, winter and spring months. During the summer, street sweepers are used primarily for summer road preservation and other construction projects. Residential streets are swept 3-4 times a year, typically during the daytime. Arterials are swept about once a month, typically during the late afternoon or evening. The county coordinates its sweeping schedule with garbagerecycling pickup to avoid conflicts. Upcoming street sweeping

Clark County provides an online interactive map so residents can get a general idea for when their streets are

scheduled for sweeping. This information will allow them to move parked vehicles, basketball hoops and other items that can prevent sweepers from covering the entire street and picking up as much debris as possible. Residents can type their address in the "Search by Address" field to see a recent sweeping history for their street, as well as when their street will be swept next.

The map provides a spectrum of colors for upcoming sweeping, from red signifying "One to five business days" to blue indicating "More than four weeks." A complete color key can be accessed by clicking on "Legend" in the map's upper right corner. Residents should remember that this map provides a general estimate for when streets may be swept, not a firm timetable for when they will be swept. A number of factors, from bad weather to mechanical breakdowns, can and will affect when streets are swept. County Public Works appreciates your cooperation and understanding.

Vegetation trimming along streets

For maximum coverage during street sweeping, residents should trim lowhanging branches and other vegetation so sweepers can get as close to the curb as possible. .All low-hanging material needs to be trimmed to provide 14 feet of vertical clearance from the top of the curb. Another 8 feet of clearance should be provided for the full width of the sidewalk.

Wishful Recycling

Effects 99 out of 100 citizens. This affliction causes people to place items in their curb side recycle bin that do not belong there. First off, Clark County does not go by the Universal Recycle Symbol or the recycle number on plastics. Not that Waste Connections does not want your stuff, it is just that they do not have

markets/vendors in our area to take your stuff. Other parts of the country might have vendors. A recent audit has revealed that roughly 20% of what people are putting in their recycle bins is (10% garbage and 10% wishful recycling). In addition China has tighten up their restrictions in that they only want quality recyclables. To that ends we all need to pitch in and make an extra effort to adhere to RECYCLING DONE **RIGHT** guidelines.

When in doubt it is best to just throw it out. Non-recyclable items in the recycle bin end up taking the long way to the landfill. That is if they are caught in time. Otherwise, they contaminate the good recyclables. In addition Waste Connection truck drivers make anywhere between 400 to 1200 pickup stops with the average being 800 daily. Save yourself some time and energy by only putting your recycle bins out when they are 3/4 full or more. The same applies to the glass recycle bins.
