Lantern Tours at Fort Vancouver

See Fort Vancouver in a whole new light... by Lantern! The Fort Vancouver National Historic site will again be offering its popular Lantern Tour series for the 2020 season. These popular guided tours lead participants on an after-dark experience through either the reconstructed Fort Vancouver or the Historic Vancouver Barracks.



As in Past years, each adult attending the program will carry their own candle lantern and tour with Park Rangers through the reconstructed fort's Counting House, Fur Store, Chief Factor's House, Kitchen, and Bake House. Peek into the past with vignettes by costumed interpreters and learn about your urban national park then and now. These vignettes transport the visitor back in time to exhibit what life was like at Fort Vancouver in the 1840s.

Lantern Tours: "An Evening at the Fort" takes place inside the Fort Vancouver stockade. All Lantern Tours take place at least partially outdoors and will occur rain or shine, so be sure to dress for the weather.

Admission is \$25 per adult and \$10 per youth. All tours begin at 7:30 PM and are prepaid reservations only; reservations for the Lantern Tours are open now. All reservations are required to be booked online at www.friendsfortvancouver.org.

Reservations are non-refundable and non-transferable to another date. Due to the program length, Lantern Tours are not recommended for children under the age of 10.

ID Laws for Air Travel are changing

After the 911 terrorist attacks Congress passed the REAL ID ACT in 2005 to bring better security to airports. The ACT established minimum security standards for state-issued Driver Licenses and ID Cards which can be used for access thru TSA airport security. Starting OCTOBER 1st, 2020 anyone wishing to board an airplane or access certain Facilities controlled by the Federal Government will be required to present a REAL ID Driver's compliant "Enhanced" License (EDL) or "Enhanced" ID Card (EID).

Washington State already offers, but does not mandate "Enhanced" Driver's Licenses or "Enhanced" ID Card that require proof of citizenship.



Washington was among many states that struggled for years to comply with READ ID enhanced security standards. As concerns about residents not being able to use their licenses to board domestic flight increased, Washington State lawmakers passed a measure last year creating a two-tiered licensing system. The cost of a standard six-year license is \$54; the "Enhanced" licenses is \$78 for six-years. Residents have a choice of which license they want. Again, stating Oct. 1st, 2020, those with non-compliant licenses will need additional documentation - such as a passport, permanent resident card or military ID - to board domestic commercial flights.

Wishful Recycling

Effects 99 out of 100 citizens. This affliction causes people to place items in their curb side recycle bin that do not belong there. First off, Clark County does not go by the Universal Recycle Symbol or the recycle number Not that plastics. Waste Connections does not want your stuff, it is just that they do not have markets/vendors in our area to take your stuff. Other parts of the country might have vendors. A recent audit has revealed that roughly 20% of what people are putting in their recycle bins is (10% garbage and 10% wishful recycling). China has tightened up their restrictions in that they only want quality recyclables. To that ends we all need to pitch in and make an extra effort to adhere to RECYCLING DONE RIGHT guidelines.

When in doubt it is best to just throw it out. Non-recyclable items in the recycle bin end up taking the long way to the landfill. That is if they are caught in time. Otherwise, they contaminate the good recyclables. Waste Connection truck drivers make anywhere between 400 to 1200 pickup stops with the daily average being 800. Save yourself some time and energy by only putting your recycle bins out when they are 3/4 full or more. The same applies to the glass recycle bins. The Future is Approaching

In 1998, Kodak had 170,00 employees and sold 85% of all the photo paper worldwide. Within a few years their business model disappeared and they went bankrupt. What happen to Kodak will happen to a lot of industries in the next 10 years and most people won't see it coming. Digital cameras were invented in 1975. The first ones only had 10,000 pixels, but followed Moore's Law. Moore's Law states that we can expect the speed and capability of our computers to increase every couple of years and we will pay less for them. So with exponential

technologies, it was a disappointment for a time, before it became way superior and became mainstream in only a few short years. It will now happen again with Artificial Intelligence, Health, Autonomous and Electric Cars, Education, 3D-Printing, Agriculture and Jobs. Welcome to the 4th Industrial Revolution. Welcome to the Exponential Age.

Software will disrupt most traditional industries in the next 5-10 years. Uber is just a software tool, they don't own any cars, and are now the biggest taxi company in the world. Airbnb is now the biggest hotel company in the world, although they don't own any properties. With Artificial Intelligence computers will become exponentially better in understanding the world. In the United States, young lawyers already don't get jobs. Because of IBM's Watson you can get legal advice (so far for more or less basic stuff) within seconds, with 90% accuracy compared to 70% accuracy when done by humans. Watson already helps nurses diagnosing cancer, its 4X more accurate than human nurses. Facebook now has a pattern recognition software that can recognize faces better than humans. By 2030, computers will become more intelligent than humans.

In a few years, autonomous self-driving cars will be common mainstream. And the complete industry will start to be disrupted. You don't want to own your own car anymore. You will call a car with your phone and it will show up at your location and drive you to your destination. You will not need to park it. You only pay for the driven distance and can be productive while being transported.

Our kids will never get a driver's license and never need to own a car. It will change the cities, because we will need 90-95% less cars for city life. We can transform former parking spaces into parks. 1.2 million people die in car accidents worldwide each year. We now have one accident every 60,000 miles, with autonomous driving that will drop to one accident in 6 million miles. That will save a million lives each year. Most car companies will

probably become bankrupt. Traditional car companies try the evolutionary approach and just build a better car, while Tech companies (Tesla, Apple, Google) will do the revolutionary approach and build a computer on wheels. Insurance companies will have massive trouble because without accidents, the insurance will become 100X cheaper. Their insurance business model will disappear.

Real Estate will change. Because, if you can work while you commute, people will move further away to live in a more beautiful neighborhood. Electric cars will become mainstream shortly. Cities will be less noisy because all new cars will run on electricity. Electricity will become incredibly cheap and clean. Solar production of energy has been on an exponential curve for 30 years, but you can now see the burgeoning impact. Within the last two years more solar energy was installed worldwide than fossil. Energy companies desperately trying to limit access to the grid to prevent competition from home solar installations, but that can't last. Technology will take care of that strategy.

With cheap electricity comes cheap and abundant water. Desalination of salt water now only needs 2KWh per cubic meter (@ 0.25 cents). We don't have scarce water in most places, we only have scarce drinking water. Imagine what will be possible if anyone can have as much clean water as they want, for nearly no cost.

In the area of Health: There are companies who will build a medical device (called the "Tricorder" from Star Trek) that works with your phone, which takes a retina scan, your blood sample and you breath into it. It then analyses 54 Bio-markers that will identify nearly any disease. It will be cheap, so in a few years everyone on this planet will have access to world class medical analysis, nearly for free. 3D-printing: The price of the cheapest 3D printer came down from \$18,000 to \$400 within 10 years. In the same time, it became 100X faster. All major shoe companies have already started 3D-printing shoes. Some spare

airplane parts are already 3D printed in remote airports. The space station now has a printer that eliminates the need for the large amount of spare parts they used to have in the past. Presently some new smart phones have 3D scanning possibilities. You can then 3D scan your feet and print your perfect shoe at home. In China, they already 3D printed and built a complete 6 story office building. By 2027, 10% of everything that's being produced will be 3D printed.

Future business opportunities: If you think of a niche you want to go in, first ask yourself: "In the future, do I think we will have that?" and if the answer is yes, how can you make that happen sooner? If it doesn't work on your phone, forget the idea. And any idea designed for success in the 20th century is doomed to fail in the 21st century. Work: 70-80% of jobs will disappear in the next 20 years. There will be a lot of new jobs, but it is not clear if there will be enough new jobs in such a short time. This will require a rethink on wealth distribution.

Agriculture: There will be a \$100 agricultural robot in the future. Farmers in 3rd world countries can then become managers of their field instead of working all day in their fields. Aeroponics will need much less water. The first petri dish produced of veal, is now available and will be cheaper than cow produced veal. Right now, 30% of all agricultural surface is used for cows. Imagine if we don't need that space anymore. There are several start-ups who will bring insect protein to the market shortly. It contains more protein than meat. It will be labeled as "alternative protein source (because most people still reject the idea of eating insects).

There is an app called "moodies" which can already tell in which mood you're in. Soon there will be apps that can tell by your facial expressions, if you are lying. Imagine a political debate where it's being displayed when they're telling the truth and when they're not.

We may be around to see some of this!
