This year's Parade, set for Saturday, May 18, celebrates that tradition with the theme "Generations of Music." Presented each year by the Hazel Dell/Salmon Creek Business Association, the Parade showcases the talented musicians from more than two dozen local high school and middle school bands.

In keeping with the Generations theme, the Hazel Dell/Salmon Creek Business Association is proud to announce that this year's Parade Grand Marshals are the father and son duo of Neil Kimsey and Greg Kimsey. The well-known father and son are long-time community advocates and have spent decades locally in public service.

Emergency Assistance

Calling For Assistance in Clark County: There are two easy 3 digit numbers to remember in Clark County if you need Law Enforcement, Fire or Medical assistance. One of these numbers is universal almost nationwide and should only be used when immediate medical, law enforcement or fire response is needed. That number is of course 9-1-1. Dispatchers at CRESA 911 are available 24/7 to assist you, provide assistance, and get emergency responders moving your way.

Should I Call 9-1-1 or 3-1-1? The other number, 3-1-1, is the non-emergency law enforcement line for clark county. What does that really mean? Non-Emergency Law Enforcement means those times you need to talk to law enforcement regarding a crime that is NOT in progress, and/or life safety isn't currently a risk. Examples of this may be reporting graffiti on a fence or stolen yard property; basically a crime that occurred in the past. This line is only for non-emergency law

enforcement. **ALL medical and fire related calls should be 9-1-1.**

9-1-1: All Fire, Medical, Crime in progress and/or current life safety risk.

3-1-1: All Non-Emergency Law Enforcement, examples include report stolen property, graffiti, or abandoned vehicles.

CERT Training Classes

Have you ever asked yourself: #1- Am I prepared for a disaster? #2- Is my neighborhood self-sufficient for at least three days after a disaster? #3- Who will help me or my neighbor if injured or trapped in our homes after a large scale disaster impacting our whole community?

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training is a 20+ hour curriculum consisting of the following:

- Disaster Preparedness
- Basic Fire suppression
- Disaster Medical Operations
- Light Urban Search & Rescue
- Disaster Psychology
- CERT Organization and Communications
- Terrorism Awareness
- Course Review & Final Drill

Fall Training classes will be held Sept. - Oct. 2019. The course fee is \$35.00 per person. Minimum age is 18 without an adult or 16 with an adult. There is not a maximum age limit. People of all skills and abilities are encouraged to participate. All participants must be Clark County residents. All classes must be attended to receive a course completion certificate and to participate in activities and future training with the Clark County, WA CERT group. The fall class will be expanded to accommodate 50 students. Class will be filled in the order that applications with fees are received. For more information go to www.ccf6.org or call 360-576-1195.

Crime Tips:

Identity Theft - Identity theft is a growing problem across the US. Criminals use personal information such as date of birth and social security numbers to pose as you for illegal gains. You can protect yourself by not carrying important numbers or passwords with you. Report stolen credit cards immediately. Review your monthly financial statements and check your Consumer Credit Report annually for fraudulent charges. Pick up your mail daily or have it held at the Post Office. Shred paperwork with your important information on it. Do not put your credit card numbers into unsecured websites.

Burglary Prevention - Burglaries remain an ongoing problem in Clark County. Most residential burglaries occur during daytime when most residents are at work. The Sheriff's Office recommends you secure your home before leaving and avoid leaving a hidden key near the door. Keep watch on your neighbor's property and report any suspicious behavior by calling 911. If you are going to be out of town put a stop on your mail and paper delivery, set automatic light timers, and request your neighbors keep watch on your property. You can also make your house a less attractive target by keeping hedges and bushes trimmed back, allowing open views to

all sides of your home and setting motion sensor lights.

Measles

Measles is a highly contagious and potentially serious illness caused by a virus. Measles is spread through the air after a person with measles coughs or sneezes. If other people breathe the contaminated air or touch a contaminated surface, then touch their eyes, noses or mouths, they can be infected. The virus can linger in the air for up to two hours after someone who is infectious has left the area.

Measles symptoms begin with a high fever, cough, runny nose and red eyes, followed by a rash that usually begins at the head and spreads to the rest of the body. A person can spread the virus before they show symptoms. People are contagious with measles for up to four days before and up to four days after the rash appears. After someone is exposed to measles, illness develops in about one to three weeks.

Anyone who has been exposed and believes they have the symptoms should call their health care provider before visiting the medical office. This will enable the clinic to develop a plan for providing care without exposing others at the clinic.

Opt-Out of Junk Mail & Cut Paper Waste

Credit card offers, catalogs, coupon booklets, flyers and phone books tend to multiply and pile up. While all of these things can be recycled, if you don't want them in the first place, a better way to deal with them is to take your name off their mailing or delivery list. There are several companies that offer an "Opt-Out service".

Opt-Out - Marketing Junk Mail:

You can have your name removed from marketing mailing lists by contacting the Direct Marketing Association (DMA). Visit the DMA's website at www.DMAchoice.org or call 212-768-7277 ext.1888. If you do not have internet access, the DMA offers both an online and a mail in option for residents. To register on line there is a small transaction fee of \$2 and a \$3 registration fee if you do it by mail. When mailing please include your printed name (with a signature), a complete mailing address, a check or money order for \$3 and mail to DMAchoice, Direct Marketing Choice, P.O. Box 900, Cos Cob, CT 06807.

Opt-Out - Telephone Directory:

You can opt-out of receiving a telephone directory at www.yellowpagesoptout.com. It may take up to 12 weeks for the selections to be accepted by the publisher's internal systems. Note: Directory publishers listed on this site generally do not accept opt-out requests from third parties or websites proclaiming to submit requests on your behalf. Protect your personal information by using the website to work directly with the directory publishers.

Safety Corner:

Staying Safe in an earthquake

** Drop, cover, and then hold on. Drop to your hands and knees. Cover your head and neck with your hands. Hold on to any sturdy furniture until the shaking stops. Crawl only if you can reach better cover without going through an area with more debris.

** If inside, stay there until the shaking stops. DO NOT run outside.

** If in a vehicle, stop in a clear area that is away from buildings, trees, overpasses, underpasses, or utility wires.

** If you are in a high-rise building, expect fire alarms and sprinklers to go off. DO NOT use elevators.

** If near slopes, cliffs, or mountains, be alert for failing rocks and landslides.

Why Recycle Light Bulbs

Washington state law requires that all mercury-containing lights be recycled, as mercury is a potent neurotoxin. Although a single fluorescent light contains a very small amount of mercury, millions of these lights are sold every year in Washington state. Taken together, the mercury from fluorescent lights and HIDs has the potential to harm human and the environment if not properly recycled.

Unbroken lights are safe to handle and use. Disposing of mercury-containing lights in regular garbage can cause the mercury to be released if they break. Recycling these lights prevents the mercury from being released. Since mercury can vaporize at room temperature, it could be released from broken lights in your home, in landfills, or at any point in-between. Mercury can be particularly harmful to children, infants and fetuses by impairing neurological development.

Visit www.LightRecycleWA.org or call 877-592-2972 x 354. Fluorescent Light Tubes (straight or curved), CFLs and High Intensity Discharge Lights (HIDs) can be recycled. Individuals can recycle up to 10 lights per day at no charge. Easy drop off locations are: Globe Lights & Filbin's ACE Hardware at 809 NE Minnehaha, Clark Public Utilities at 100 Columbia Way and any of the Waste Connections

facilities. Also Batteries Plus Bulbs at 1218 NE 88th Street, but they charge a small service fee.

Separate glass and don't place in big blue recycling bin. Recycle plastic bags at the grocery store or reuse at home.

Because you put a lot of effort into recycling, we want to help you do it right. Please remember to keep plastic bags, plastic wrap and glass out of your blue recycle cart. These items can clog sorting machines and create a hazard for workers.

Street Advertisement

Ever wonder who is responsible for those pop-up street advertisement signs like: GUN SHOW; BUY YOUR HOME; TAX SERVICE; BUY OR SELL THIS OR THAT; GARAGE SALE; etc... Well these signs are illegal if placed on State or County or City or Private property without permission. If signs appear and are never taken down, you may contact Clark County Code Enforcement 360-397-2408 or fill out a form to report neighborhood or safety concerns at <https://www.clark.wa.gov/community-development/report-safety-concern>.

Unclaimed signs are also a form of litter and blight to the neighborhood. Violators can be subject to fines of \$103 per violation and/or community service.

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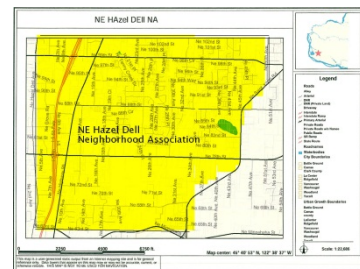
