Medicare Scams Update

As of April 2019 the Federal Government completed issuing new Medicare Cards. The new card is called the Medicare Beneficiary Identifier or MBI Card which has a new number that's unique to you, instead of your Social Security Number. This will help protect your identity. Scam artists are already at work trying to steal your information. What should you do if someone calls and asks for your information, for money, or threatens to cancel your health benefits if you don't share your personal information or use your benefits in a timely manner? "Hang Up! It's a scam." Scam artists may try to steal your personal information by calling and asking you to confirm receipt of your new MBI Card along with other information. Medicare will never call uninvited and ask you to give out personal information. If you get a suspicious call like this, call 1-800-633-4227. For more information go www.medicare.gov

NE 68th Street Sidewalks Project

In early June Clark County and the City of Vancouver invited residents to attend an open house at the NE Hazel Dell Elementary School to review the NE 68th Sidewalk Project. The County and City are partnering on the project which is meant to fill in the gaps between existing segments of sidewalks on the South side of the road. Additional pedestrian safety improvements are in the plans as well. NE 68th Street between Hwy 99 and

NE Saint Johns Road serves a densely populated residential neighborhood with an average daily traffic flow of 3,288 vehicles. Presently the road has limited segments of sidewalks.



The proposed improvements include:

- fill in segments of missing sidewalks on the South side of the road for approximately 5,500 feet.
- addition of 4 crosswalks from the South side to the North side of the road at NE 14th Avenue, NE 17th Avenue, Hazel Dell Community Park, and NE 28th Avenue.
- new street lights at each crosswalk.
- warning signs for pedestrian crossings.
- possible rapid flashing crosswalk beacon at the NE 14th Avenue location due to the limited sight line.

Stormwater Conservation

We all should be concerned about stormwater runoff. The increasing development of our county has led to natural surfaces being covered by roofs, yards, streets and parking lots. Excessive runoff from these impervious surfaces leads to erosion and carries pollution into streams and rivers.



Improving our management stormwater runoff can protect drinking water, wildlife habitat, recreation and other quality of life factors. Low Impact Development (LID) is an approach to land development or redevelopment that works with the natural landscape to manage and minimize stormwater runoff. LID preserves and recreates natural landscape features and minimizes impervious surfaces that prevent water from soaking into the ground, to create functional and appealing site drainage that treats stormwater as a resource rather than a waste product.

Clark County now requires low-impact development features, including native vegetation, pervious driveways and roads, downspout diversion, bioretention features, and more natural stormwater facilities like rain gardens.

In addition to the environmental benefits Clark County businesses and residents benefit financially from having several local businesses that offer LID products and installation/maintenance services. For more information go to www.clark.wa.gov/publicworks and click on stormwater.

Bigger is Better

Bigger is better when it comes to recycling. According to Connections the bigger the recycled item is the more likely it will make it all the way thru the recycle process and equipment. Items that are smaller than your fist will most likely fall out of the automatic sorting equipment. Any mixed paper if torn in to smaller pieces will most likely fall out of the automatic sorting equipment and land on the floor where it is classified as trash. Large pieces of cardboard should be cut down to a size that will fit inside your blue or pink recycle bin. Also dry cardboard is more valuable than wet cardboard. All glass items should always be placed in their separate collection bin. Broken glass is a hazard and will get caught in the sorting equipment or just fall out of the equipment. Always remember if you question if something is recyclable or not it is best to just throw it out rather than contaminate the good recyclables. School Bus Stop Rules

A new school year has started and many of our children will be riding the busses to and from school. The Washington State Patrol (WSP) would like you to take a few minutes to refresh your knowledge on how to drive safely around school busses as they are picking up and dropping off our children.



The WSP has posted a video discussing rules of the road and driving safety around the school busses; when you have to stop and when may proceed. The School Bus Stop Rules video is posted at http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mo K9MZVSIQY&feature=plcp

The law states the \$394 fine for failure to stop for a school bus cannot be reduced, suspended, or waived. If you get a ticket for failure to stop for a school bus you will pay the full amount.

We cannot stress enough how important it is to practice safe driving, especially when children are present.

Graffiti Removal Update

Do you have concerns about the amount of GRAFFITI popping up in the NE Hazel Dell area, as well as Clark County, the city of Vancouver and your State and Federal Highway corridors? Well you can be part of the solution. The experts advise that graffiti must be removed ASAP to send a message that it is not acceptable. Otherwise, left standing it conveys a message that we do not care and it is OK to add more. Graffiti has a negative impact on community livability and it is a blight to our neighborhoods commercial and districts. Graffiti can even lower your property value. Studies show that graffiti, if removed with-in 24 hours to 48 hours results in a nearly zero rate of re-occurrence. Please make every effort to remove the graffiti on your property ASAP.

The Clark County Sheriff's Office recommends that you report an active Graffiti Artist or Taggers right away by calling 911. Otherwise they request you to document the graffiti with a picture and report the date and location of the graffiti and a description including the color and type of surface

(wood fence, concrete, etc.) to the Sheriff's Department, Community Outreach Unit, at 360-397-2211 ext. 3380.

To report graffiti on the I-5; I-205; SR-14; SR-500; SR-503 corridors please email Mike London, SW Region Bridge Supervisor

<u>londonm@wsdot.wa.gov</u> and give a full detailed location of the graffiti.

If you see graffiti on Private Property in the city of Vancouver, please call the Vancouver Police Department 360-487-7355. If you see graffiti on Electrical Boxes, please call Clark PUD 360-992-3000. If you see graffiti at Bus stops, please call C-TRAN 360-695-0123.

If you notice graffiti on Private Property that never seems to go away, we can help. As your Neighborhood Association we have composed a letter that we would be happy to send out to the Private Property owner that will draw their attention to the matter and hopefully get some actions. PET LICENSING

Licensed pets have benefits:

- They are more likely to quickly be reunited with their owners.
- They receive longer care periods at shelters.
- They are transferred to an emergency medical care facility if found with an injury.



In Clark County pet license applications are required for all cats, dogs and wild or exotic pets older than eight weeks. Once the pet turns six

months you will be sent a notice to pay a licensing fee.

Applications and forms are online for pet license applications for all pets atwww.clark.wa.gov then click on SERVICES and select ANIMALS AND PETS.

Fees:

Fees are required for pets older than six months. They are valid for 12 months.

Cats: Fertile - \$40; Altered - \$20

Dogs: Fertile - \$50; Altered - \$25

Wild animal - \$100

Low-income assistance - Pet license fee assistance is available for households that have limited incomes and are located in unincorporated Clark County or the city of Vancouver. Only one dog and one cat per household may qualify. Pets must be spayed or neutered.

Fines - The fine for having an unlicensed dog or cat in unincorporated Clark County and the cities of Vancouver and Yacolt is \$100 per animal. If an owner who receives a citation licenses the animal within 10 business days, the fine will be reduced by half. A second fine will cost \$200 and a third will cost \$400. Failure to pay a fine could create a lien against the owner's property.

Where to purchase a license Licensing agents may charge a fee of up to \$5 per license.



Abandoned Vehicles

Do you have vehicles in your neighborhood that litter the street and

never seem to move? Well, according to Washington State Law, any motor vehicle that is parked on any public street and has not moved in 3 days (72 hours) can be declared abandoned and subject to towing. It is recommended that you call the Police non-emergency phone number "311" to report the



vehicle's location; make; model and license plate ID code. In comparison, vehicles parked within the city limits of Vancouver streets must be moved within one day (24 hours) before they can be reported as abandoned.

Stranger Danger

Attacks from strangers are rare in Clark County but it is always good to use safe practices when in public. Keep yourself from being an easy target by maintaining good posture, make eye contact with others, and avoid items that limit your awareness such as headphones, cell phones, alcohol and drugs. It is always safer to travel in a group. Teach kids to avoid conversations with strangers and to yell for help if a stranger grabs them.

Why Recycle Light Bulbs

Washington state law requires that all mercury-containing lights be recycled, as mercury is a potent neurotoxin. Although a single fluorescent light contains a very small amount of mercury, millions of these lights are sold every year in Washington state. Taken together, the mercury from fluorescent lights and HIDs has the potential to harm humans and the environment if not properly recycled.



Unbroken lights are safe to handle and use. Disposing of mercury-containing lights in regular garbage can cause the mercury to be released if they break. Recycling these lights prevents the mercury from being released. Since mercury can vaporize at room temperature, it could be released from broken lights in your home, in landfills, or at any point in-between. Mercury can be particularly harmful to children, infants and fetuses by impairing neurological development.

Visit www.LightRecycleWA.org or call 877-592-2972 x 354. Fluorescent Light Tubes (straight or curved), CFLs and High Intensity Discharge Lights (HIDs) can be recycled. Individuals can recycle up to 10 lights per day at no charge. Easy drop off locations are: Globe Lights at 809 NE Minnehaha, Clark Public Utilities at 100 Columbia Way and any of the Waste Connections facilities. Also Batteries Plus Bulbs at 1218 NE 88th Street, but they charge a small service fee.

Code Enforcement

Code Enforcement is a special type of law enforcement that regulates land use. The county obtains its authority to regulate land use from the police powers conferred upon it by the Washington State Constitution which permits counties to make and enforce within its limits all local, police, sanitary, and other ordinances and regulations not in conflict with general laws of the land. Unless in conflict with state law, the courts generally view land use ordinances as valid exercises of police power when reasonably related to public health, safety, and welfare. Clark County has adopted several land use ordinances to combat public nuisance including but not limited to:

- Unified Development Code (zoning ordinance)
- Public nuisance ordinance
- International building and fire codes including dangerous buildings

The county's philosophy is that compliance is the primary goal and

education is the key to reaching that goal. Many citizens do not realize that they are violating local ordinances. However, most people are willing to play by the rules if they know them.

Reporting a violation

When reporting a violation to Code Enforcement, be prepared to provide them with detailed information, like:

- a detailed property address of the violation
- a description of the violation
- your name and phone number
