CC Fair Cancelled

For the second year in a row the Clark County Fair Board has decided to cancel the 2021 Fair due to the concerns surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic. The fair had been scheduled



for Aug. 6-15. The Fair historically results in large crowds in relatively small spaces. Based on current Washington state guidelines for events and

fairs, the Fair Board felt it would be challenged to monitor and maintain distance and health & safety for our guest and volunteers. The last time the fair was canceled was in 1942 during WW II. That one year closure was followed by smaller "Victory Fairs" from 1943 through 1945.

The Clark County Event Center will be offering family fun events at the fair grounds this summer. The Family Fun series will consist of a 10 day carnival, tuff truck and monster truck shows and a bull-riding rodeo. Each event will be stand-alone and separately ticketed. These events will be managed and presented under current Washington State Health Department Covid-19 guidance. Events dates are set for: Tuff trucks ... July 30th & 31st Monster trucks ... August 1st Carnival Days... August 6th thru 15th Bull-riding ... mid August (TBA) Visit the Clark County Event Center website www.clarkcoeventcenter.com for updates, ticket links, prices and times.

Postal Rate Increase Coming

The U.S. Postal Service plans to increase the price of first-class stamps to 58 cents from 55 cents as a means to stabilize finances following chronic

deficits amid slumping mail volume and slower delivery schedules. This rate increase will take place August 29th, 2021 and



should help the U.S. Postal Service to remain viable and competitive. Mail delivery has remained sluggish since slowing down last year after Postmaster General Louis DeJoy cut overtime, extra trips by delivery trucks and streamlined agency operations in an effort to rein in costs. DeJoy's 10 year "Delivering for America" plan calls for longer delivery windows, shorter Post Office hours and fewer staff.



C-Tran Bus Updates

Recently their Board has approved the purchase of 8 new battery-powered bus models, replacing eight of the fleet's oldest diesel models. Plans for the purchase have been in the works since 2019. The current fleet consists of 117 transit buses, 66 of which are hybrids.



FIREWORKS

The 58th Annual Vancouver Fireworks Spectacular at Fort Vancouver National site was CANCELLED for a second year due to the current coronavirus pandemic. Use of fireworks within the City limits of Vancouver are illegal with fines starting at \$500.

Fireworks were originally invented in China and used for events and festivals. China also is the largest manufacturer and exporter of fireworks in the world. Modern color fireworks were invented in Europe the 1830s. Modern skyrocket fireworks have been made since the early 20th

Century. Fireworks are made to produce four primary effects: noise, light, smoke, as well as floating materials such as confetti. Also fireworks are generally classified as to where they perform, either as a ground or aerial firework. Normally firework displays are performed at night but Disney Parks often feature day time firework displays.

Recycling Paint

A new paint recycling program has opened in Clark County allowing

households and businesses to recycle leftover paint, stain and varnish



conveniently and sustainably. The program, operated by the non-profit PaintCare launched on April 1, 2021 and is now operating more than 20 paint recycling drop-off sites in Clark County and more than 150 sites across the state. PaintCare is replacing the Clark County Paint-Take-Back program that has operated since 2005 through a partnership between Clark County and Waste Connections. Dropoff locations can be found at www.paintcare.org/drop-offsites/ Most sites accept both Latex and oil based architectural paint products. Paint must be in its original container with its original manufacturer's label. The Paint Stewardship Law ensures that everyone who produces, sells and uses paint work together to manage its entire life cycle. A small fee - called the PaintCare Fee - on the sale of new paint funds all aspects of the program including paint collection, transportation, processing and public education.



Clark Neighbors Food Project

The Clark Neighbors Food Project (CNFP) is a revolutionary way to collect food: It's a donor drive, not a food drive. On the **second Saturday** of **every even month**—our Neighborhood Coordinators pick up bags of **healthy** nonperishable food that neighbors have left outside their front doors. They leave empty green bags for next time and take all the food to local Food Pantries. It's that easy!

Ruth Bader Ginsburg Honored

In May of 2021 the Vancouver School Board of Directors announced the naming of a new school in the NE Hazel Dell neighborhood as the Ruth Bader Ginsburg Elementary School slated to be open in the Fall of 2022. The title is to honor a legal pioneer who charted a historic path in law and spent a career advocating for women's rights and gender equality. RBG served on the U.S. Supreme Court from 1993 until her death in September 2020. The school will be located at 8614 NE 25th Avenue. Construction begins this summer with funds from a 2017 voter-approved Bond Measure.

Money Talks

1- The \$1 Bill hasn't changed in 58 years

2- "In God We Trust" wasn't always

printed on the \$1 Bill. The phrase was included in 1963 following a law passed by Dwight Eisenhower in 1956, making it the county's official motto.

3- The U.S. paper currency is not made of paper. The \$1 Bill is made out of a blend of 75% cotton and 25% linen.

4- It costs 7.7 cents to produce the \$1 Bill as compared to 01.99 cents to



produce a 1 cent penny and 0.12 cents to produce a \$1 coin.

- --- The \$2 Bill costs 7.7 cents.
- --- The \$5 Bill costs 15.5 cents.
- --- The \$10 Bill costs 15.9 cents.
- --- The \$20 Bill costs 16.1 cents.
- --- The \$50 Bill costs 16.1 cents.
- --- The \$100 Bill costs 19.6 cents
- 5- According to 2018 estimates Bills fall out of circulation as follows.
- --- The \$1 Bill falls out at 6.6 years.
- --- The \$2 Bill falls out at (no estimate stated)
- --- The \$5 Bill falls out at 4.7 years.
- --- The \$10 Bill falls out at 5.3 years
- --- The \$20 Bill falls out at 7.8 years.
- --- The \$50 Bill falls out at 12.2 years.
- --- The \$100 Bill falls out at 22.9 years

6- Several members of the U.S. Government had sought to switch to the \$1 coin but Americans are used to dealing with the \$1 Bill. The U.S. coin is more efficient to use because it lasts longer in circulation.

7- You can track your paper money thru the serial number printed on each Bill. You can see where your \$1 Bill has been and where it's going by using the site "Where's George."

8- The pyramid on the back of the dollar Bill represents the young country at that time.

9- The eagle on the back of the dollar Bill is meant to convey both war and peace, with the arrows held in it's left talon and an olive branch in it's right talon. The Bald Eagle was selected as a symbol for victory for two reasons: First, he is not afraid of a storm, he is strong, and he is smart enough to soar above it. Secondly, he wears no material crown.

10- In the eagle's beak is a ribbon which reads "E PLURIBUS UNUM" meaning "one from many."

11- The eagle always wants to face the olive branch, but in time of war, his gaze turns toward the arrows.

Cluster Mailbox Regulations

Community cluster mailboxes are the sole property of the United States Postal Service. The maintenance and repair of cluster boxes is the responsibility of the U. S. Postal Service. As with your personal home mailbox, tampering with the US mail or cluster boxes is a Federal Offense

and punishable by law. It is also illegal to use the cluster mailboxes as a bulletin board. NO sign postings of any kind are allowed. Delivering advertising circulars or newspapers to

individual mailboxes is also illegal. Citizens can be fined for each infraction. Yes,



individual mail boxes are owned by you but regulated by the U.S. Postal Service. If a cluster mailbox is hit with graffiti, please report it to your local Post Office ASAP. If your personal mailbox is hit with graffiti, it is your responsibility to clean it up ASAP. If you are feeling your civic pride, The U.S. Postal Service does not mind if you take a cleaning cloth to your cluster mailbox now and then.

Body Of Facts

1- Infants are born with approximately



330 bones, but as they grow some of these bones fuse together. 2- More than half of your bones are located in the hands, wrist, feet and ankles.

- 3- Every second your body produces 25 million new cells.
- 4- The largest bone in the humane body is the femur, also known as the thigh bone.
- 5- There is anywhere between 60,000 -
- -- 100,000 miles of blood vessels in the human body. If they were taken out and laid end to end, they would be long enough to travel around the world more than three times.

Reminder: Recycle Hint -
