Public Safety Complex Open House

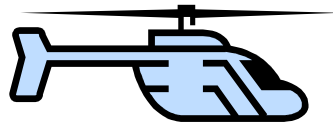

Kate & Clarence LaLonde Neighborhood Park Dedication

The 7.7-acre park is located at 4608 NE 99th Street on what was part of the LaLonde family farm for 100 years. The dedication event brief comments from Clark County Commission Chair Tom Mielke, Vancouver-Clark Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission co-chair Florence Wager, plus a colorful and entertaining history lesson from Beth Skaggs, granddaughter of Kate and Clarence LaLonde. LaLonde family members from far and wide turned out at the event to help celebrate their family's legacy in Clark County. In addition, the Northeast Hazel Dell Neighborhood Association presented their Community Partner Awards to Blind Onion, Walmart, McDonald's and Burgerville for helping with the association's many events and activities throughout the year. Free refreshments, including cupcakes and root beer floats were provided courtesy of Vicki Fitzsimmons with Edward Jones Investments, Cakes By Design, Java Depot Espresso and More, Safeway and Burgerville. Kate and Clarence LaLonde Neighborhood Park was developed late last year as part of the Greater Clark Parks District. Medical marijuana dispensaries temporarily banned in Clark County

On August 16th the Clark County Commissioners voted to extend a resolution relating to land use and zoning of medical marijuana dispensaries for a period up to six months. The moratorium will prohibit the location of any facilities for the growing or production, processing or dispensing of marijuana until further study and public analysis of this issue is completed.

A new state law recently passed allows up to 10 qualified medical-marijuana users to establish a collective garden where no more than 45 plants could be grown for personal use. There is no limit on the number of gardens allowed in the state. This new law is

ambiguous and has inconsistent rules that cities and counties have found difficult to interpret.

Under the law, cities and counties are responsible for creating zoning, health and safety rules for these medical marijuana dispensaries, as well as enforcement of the rules. Clark County has no ordinances in place that applied to the new law or marijuana dispensaries. The moratorium gives time to study the issue and determine appropriate zoning for these facilities.

Sgt. Shane Gardner, with the Clark County Sheriff's Office, will be the guest speaker at the NE Hazel Dell Neighborhood Association meeting on September 20th to talk about this issue and implications on public safety and community livability.

Immunizations save lives; protect your kids before school starts

With school starting in just a few weeks, now is a good time for parents to schedule their children for back-to-school immunizations. Several immunizations are required before children can attend public school or child care. A list of these immunizations is available at www.doh.wa.gov/cfh/Immunize/default.htm.

Call your health care provider now for an appointment and bring your child's immunization record. If you can't find the immunization record, Clark County Public Health suggests parents and guardians ask their health care provider to check the CHILD Profile Immunization Registry. Many providers use the registry to track vaccinations given to children born in Washington.

"Immunizations save lives and protect against serious and preventable illnesses such as whooping cough, chickenpox, and measles—all of which we've seen this year in Clark County," said Dr.

Alan Melnick, Clark County Health Officer. "Unimmunized children are more likely to catch and spread vaccine preventable diseases, some of which have no cure or treatment."

Immunizations for children under 19 are free through Washington's Childhood Vaccine Program. Charges for office visits or administration fees may apply. Free or low-cost immunizations for children and teens are also offered at these clinics:

Changes to school and child care immunization exemptions
Parents or guardians who want to exempt their child from school and child care immunization requirements must first get information about the benefits and risks of vaccinations from a health care provider licensed in Washington.

A new law went into effect on July 22 that requires the provider to sign a Certificate of Exemption or letter verifying that they have provided this information to the parent or guardian. Parents must turn in the certificate or letter to the school or child care center to exempt their children.

Health care providers who can sign the exemption form or write a letter include physicians (M.D.), physician assistants (P.A.), osteopaths (D.O.), naturopaths (N.D.), and advanced registered

nurse practitioners (A.R.N.P.) currently licensed in Washington. Signatures by registered nurses (R.N.), medical assistants (M.A) or licensed practical nurses (L.P.N.) are not acceptable.

Parents or guardians who demonstrate membership in a church or religious group that does not allow medical providers to treat children do not need a signed certificate or letter from a provider. Other religious exemptions require a signed form.

Unvaccinated children may be excluded from school or child care during disease outbreaks.

Immunization recommendations for all children
The meningococcal vaccine to prevent meningitis, a serious infectious disease, is recommended for all children ages 11 to 18.

Also, parents should consider the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine, available at low cost to girls and boys under 19. The vaccine protects against four types of HPV — two that cause 70 percent of cervical cancers and two that cause 90 percent of genital warts. This vaccine is not required for school.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

Many household products contain hazardous chemicals that can, if not properly disposed of, pollute water, harm wildlife and threaten your drinking water and well-being.

What is Household Hazardous Waste?

There are ways you can protect your family's health and the environment:

Avoid products marked 'danger'. Look for this word on the labels of cleaners, polishes, paint strippers and pesticides. 'Danger' means the product could poison you, cause serious damage to your skin or eyes, or easily cause a fire. Products marked 'caution' or 'warning' are safer but the best choice of all is a product that doesn't require any warning at all.

Reduce your use of pesticides in the yard and garden. Go to the Naturally Beautiful Backyards pages for more information about outdoor pesticide reduction.

Recycle your used motor oil, anti-freeze, household batteries and aerosol cans. These can all be placed out for curbside pick-up on your regular recycling pick-up day.

Use less-toxic alternatives. See our Green Cleaning pages for more information about these family-and earth-friendly substitutes.

Dispose of leftover HHW safely. When you dispose of chemicals in the storm drain or sink, the chemicals can end up in local water bodies or groundwater. If you throw them in the garbage, the chemicals can endanger collection and disposal workers. Go to Proper Disposal of HHW to learn about programs available for free disposal of hazardous products.

Residents of Clark County and its cities will have a number of opportunities to safely remove household hazardous waste, block

foam and unwanted electronics from their homes by dropping them off at mobile collection sites located throughout the county. Go to Free Collection Events (PDF) for a complete listing of dates, times, locations and instructions.
