Parade route is as follows:


S - North on NW 39<sup>th</sup> Ave. ↑

**FELIDA NA BOARD, VOLUNTEERS, AND PARTNERS:** As of June 2016, there is **one director opening** on the Felida NA Board. This position can be filled through NA Board's appointment of an eligible candidate. The appointee will serve until the next election at the **Felida NA annual meeting**.

In addition, Felida NA Board is considering redrawing director areas which may result in additional board openings and Bylaws revisions. The decision to redraw areas was based on population growth, new construction, and increasing concerns with traffic, public safety, and related infrastructure issues. To serve on the board, you must reside within formal Felida NA boundaries, preferably in director areas.

**Current Felida NA boundaries are as follows: North – Salmon Creek, East – I-5, South - NW 104<sup>th</sup> Street, West – Lake River**

All board directors and officers are volunteers. Felida NA does not have paid staff and does not reimburse board members for gas or parking. If you would like to be considered for a director position(s) on the Felida NA Board, or volunteer for the NA parks committees, please e-mail or send a note and brief bio to Dr. Milada Allen.

Volunteers and partners are welcome to participate as "contacts;" advisors or helpers for community projects, public parks and trails; or events (e.g., July 4 parade/celebration). You do not have to reside within NA to make a difference in Clark County. (Many pre-approved partners/volunteers reside outside of this NA.)

**TRAFFIC -- NW 119<sup>TH</sup> STREET: NW 36<sup>TH</sup> AVENUE - HWY 99.**

**CROSSROADS 119 COMMITTEE** was formed by Morrie Foutch in 2014

Morrie organized several concerned residents to address increasing traffic, speeding, and to explore several solutions to problems at intersection of NW 119<sup>th</sup> Street and NW 21<sup>st</sup> Avenue. The intersection has slightly elevated profiles on 119<sup>th</sup> Street, on both sides, making it hard to see cars traveling East/West and to make left turns safely. In 2014, the County response was that traffic lights and stop signs on NW 119<sup>th</sup> Street were not warranted based on the peak hour traffic counts. At that time, speed bumps/cushions were not used to calm traffic and to reduce speeds. However, with new construction along and near NW 119<sup>th</sup>/117<sup>th</sup> Streets and increased traffic and speeds, many of you called with concerns about this intersection, speeding, public safety, and dangerous school crossing.

In addition, with new construction and increased traffic near NW 119<sup>th</sup>/NW 117<sup>th</sup> Seward/Tenney/134<sup>th</sup>; 99<sup>th</sup> and 78<sup>th</sup> Streets, NW 119<sup>th</sup>/NW 117<sup>th</sup> has become a major east-west connector. Many requests -- to facilitate communication between stakeholders and the County -- have been received by the Felida NA.

Please let Felida NA Board know if you, your HOA, or a group of neighbors have your own traffic concerns committee(s); would like to explore/propose mitigation; want to participate as part of the combined group; or provide individual input on traffic along NW 119<sup>th</sup> Street, between NW 36<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Highway 99. ## **UPDATES ON PARKS, TRAILS, AND OPEN SPACES WITHIN FELIDA NA**



### **FELIDA COMMUNITY PARK – CHILDREN’S CELEBRATION AREA PROJECT::**

The Felida NA Board recognizes that there are many health, emotional, social, and physical benefits of outdoor play and recreation. Play equipment, functional, natural and artistic features provide opportunities for exercise and development of cognitive skills. Physically, sight and hearing impaired kids do not have many features in this park that would make it more interesting, user friendly, enjoyable, and more flexible They need creative park amenities to overcome challenges, enjoy user friendly/ADA areas and equipment (e.g., drums that vibrate for hearing impaired, tactile features – carvings in a rock for sight impaired, wheelchair-accessible play areas).

The Children’s Celebration Area -- in Felida Community Park -- is now officially acknowledged as an approved project by the Board of Clark County – Public Works, Clark County Parks, Parks Advisory Board, and Clark County Board of Councilors. It is included in the 2016 Draft Clark County Comprehensive Growth Management Plan slated to be approved and adopted this month. Therefore, Felida NA Board has been given a green light to finalize design, features, learning and landscaping features, and engineering drawings -- subject to approval by the Clark County Parks.

This project is listed in the Clark County Parks list as a short-term priority with a \$10,000 allocation for staff time. In addition, the Clark County Parks and Felida NA Board applied for a grant from the Parks Foundation of Clark County for the Children’s Celebration Area. A \$10,000 grant was awarded at the 2016 Parks Foundation luncheon and is deposited in the Parks Foundations’ trust account established for the Clark Parks – for the Children’s Celebration Area Project..

The estimated costs for the project are around \$57,000. The portable screening equipment is quick and easy. It takes less than one minute to determine if further testing is needed by a trained professional. It is very important to have regular vision checks, especially for children, to screen for any visual problems such as nearsightedness, farsightedness, amblyopia, or a “lazy eye” – where one eye sees fine and other eye does not see very well. ### **COUGAR CREEK WOODS COMMUNITY PARK (CCWCP) AND COUGAR CREEK TRAIL:**

On March 8, 2016 the Board of Clark County Councilors (BOCCC) -- with Clark County Parks and Parks Advisory Board's recommendations for approval -- unanimously (5:0) approved the Cougar Creek Woods Community Park (CCWCP) and Cougar Creek Trail site concept plan for Alternative 3, the preferred alternative. Congratulations!!!

Extensive Felida NA board outreach, community participation, and votes for alternatives were documented from 2009-2015 for the park, trailhead, and trails. See maps, matrices, and summaries displayed in the Felida NA booth on 7-4-16.

**Alternative 4** – the "do nothing" alternative was overwhelmingly rejected by all, even those who did not or could not vote (e.g., did not reside within Felida NA boundaries, lived in cities, or visiting from other counties).

**Alternative 3** – is the preferred alternative. It works with nature and site-specific resources and limitations, and includes ADA play areas and trails. It received the highest percentage of votes.

After trying to save the park for several years, two years ago, Felida NA board and CCWCP park committee received an enthusiastic support from Councilor David Madore. He encouraged us to proceed with our efforts to finalize the site concept plan, and re-explore partnerships with County - PW, County Parks, and Advisory Board. Special thanks to:

- Councilor Madore, BOCCC – for two years of support for the CCWCP/Trail project
- BOCCC unanimous (5:0) vote in 2016 to approve the CCWCP/Trails concept site plan
- Bill Bjerke, Clark County Parks manager – Felida NA Board nominee for a 2016 Florence B. Wager Award<sup>2</sup>
- Parks Advisory Board for their support and unanimous recommendation for approval to BOCCC
- Community members, partners, contractors waiting to be paid, and dedicated Felida NA Board volunteers

Felida NA board members donated, fundraised, and invested \$10,000 and 5,000 volunteer hours to develop the concept site plan with extensive public outreach and input. This represents, approximately, \$70,000 value-added to date, and higher with new IRS volunteer rates. Felida NA Board owes consultants \$3,000. In addition, Felida NA has 27 partner teams waiting to participate in the final design and construction in 2018, or sooner, if approved by the County. All of these could be in-kind match for the RCO grant as Felida NA, Vancouver-Clark Parks, and partners did for the RCO grant for the Felida Community Park.

### **ANNOUNCEMENTS:**

Scott Clemans was recently hired as the Clark County Community Outreach Coordinator. ## **Household Hazardous Waste (HHW): What is it and where can I dispose of it?**

The first thing that comes to my mind when someone says household hazardous waste is a large black oil drum with a radioactive label on the side of it headed to a nuclear containment facility. I certainly don't think of the bleach in my laundry room, the pesticides in my shed, and the oil in my garage, however, this is household hazardous waste (HHW). It's the paints, pesticides, poisons, automotive fluids, and household chemicals we find in our houses, garages, sheds, and barns.

Now, if you're anything like me, you have a bunch of this stuff around the house. After only nine months in my new home I already have leftover paint cans and motor oil; the questions is, how do I dispose of this stuff? I'm environmentally conscious and I don't want to dump it down the drain or try and sneak it into my garbage, so what do I do?

The answer, take it to the transfer station. There are three transfer stations in Clark County that accept HHW for FREE on most Fridays and weekends. Their locations and hours for HHW disposal are:

Now if you've never been to the transfer station it can be a little intimidating. They are big facilities and it seems like everyone knows what to do except you. Well, here's the inside scoop. If you're going to the West Vancouver facility, just tell the people when you drive up you have HHW and they'll let you drive right through. At the Central Transfer Station, do the same thing. And if you're going to the Washougal Transfer Station, pass the main entrance and follow the signs to the back. Easy!

So next time you hear household hazardous waste, think oven cleaner and not a radioactive spill site. And the next time you need to get rid of HHW, just say to yourself, "Take it to the Transfer Station!"

## YELLOW DOT PROGRAM – STATE OF WASHINGTON

Several Clark County stakeholders inquired regarding background of the Washington State Yellow Dot Program (WA YDP)– for motor vehicles and why there is no publicity about the voluntary program that took so long to implement. Yes, a Yellow Dot Program was established in the state of Connecticut in 2002 and did take much longer to do that with WA YDP, which was proposed for several legislative cycles by a group of concerned community members of Clark County. Yes, after several persistent efforts (2006 – 2013), the WA YDP had been implemented in the State of Washington, adding a new section to chapter 46.16A RCW. Yes, Jim Moeller, Representative is concerned with public health, safety, and welfare. Thank you for asking about the background and history behind the WA YDP.

Donna Brase, a concerned Clark County resident, approached several legislators, first responder and law enforcement agencies to assist her to develop and introduce a Take a Second Look (now WA YDP) bill in Olympia. In 2006, after several unsuccessful attempts, Donna was told by an enforcement agency to contact Jamie Allen. Jamie immediately formed a Take a Second Look (TSL) Committee to explore possibilities, process, goals and intent, legislative requirements, and facilitate community input and communication. The primary goal and intent statements were finalized for the TSL. Primary Goal: to protect public health, safety, and welfare of drivers with legitimate temporary or permanent impairments or special needs. Intent to provide emergency responders, law enforcement, passenger, and bystanders with relevant information to help avoid unintended consequences. Intent: to encourage law enforcement and emergency/first responders to “take a second look” and utilize more, effective techniques to assist drivers with legitimate disabilities (not qualifying for disabled placards); medically or physically impaired.

The then TSL committee co-chairs, Jamie Allen, Felida NA president, and Milada Allen, ex-officio Felida NA president, encouraged individuals, community members, and many service providers and agencies to provide input. Initially, over 1,500 responses and comments were received:

- 1) The overwhelming majority of input was very positive. Many stated that the TSL could prevent unintended consequences like those reported in the media or shared confidentially (e.g., a DUI-type of response vs. diabetic shock response).
- 2) A few community members with medical impairments, had concerns that this would be a mandatory requirement to register or to track medical conditions. However, the TSL/WA YDP was proposed, passed and ratified as a voluntary program providing an opportunity to provide information to first responders or law enforcement for effective assistance to drivers voluntarily in WA YDP.
- 3) Many suggested that the effort should give an opportunity for all people to declare specific needs, not just drivers of motorized vehicles. However, this option was rejected by legislators in order to start with achievable goals and to avoid fiscal notes (public budget allocations based on estimated costs). Could expand the program, if determined to be needed and/or viable.

Furthermore, in 2008, Dr. Milada Allen received many positive comments and letters of support -- including from the then Clark County Board of Commissioners, Clark County Sheriff, Mayor of Vancouver, Clark County Neighborhood Associations Council, and veterans. Donna Brase secured letters of support from several first responder and law enforcement agencies. However, the minimal proposed motorized vehicle driver WA YDP bill generated over a \$1M fiscal note to improve state computer systems. These fiscal notes lingered even after several changes, a higher user-fee-based program, and removing all references to interactive data/code access by law enforcement (e.g., the routine computer/data check prior to initial contact with the driver when stopping a vehicle or responding to an accident).

Donna Brase, Jamie Allen, and Milada Allen regularly e-mailed all legislators; made many trips to Olympia; met and talked with several local legislators, and testified several times in the State House of Representatives, Senate and legislative committees. (Once during a bad snowstorm.) During one legislative cycle, a revised WA YDP House bill (HB) passed -- with almost a 100% vote – by the State House of Representatives. It had to be re-introduced during subsequent legislative session only to be stuck in the Senate twice – once by a local senator calling for a vote. Barbara Anderson, Sue Lintz, John Russell, and Terry Allen joined the team during last legislative cycle to assist with testimony in the House of Representatives and the Senate. Representative Jim Moeller became the WA YDP champion. He became an ardent advocate of this bill to protect public health and safety. He persevered and was successful in getting this program implemented as a fee-based self-funded budget item. The Department of Licensing (DOL) was directed to implement a voluntary WA YDP and provide the Yellow Dot window decal and folder to qualified drivers with legitimate temporary or permanent medical/physical needs. It directs the DOL to charge a fee that is sufficient to cover the costs associated with WA YDP (e.g., there is no cost to the State of WA or DOL).

Felida NA Board nominated Bill Bjerke, Clark County Parks manager, for the 2016 Florence B. Wager Award. Congratulations, Bill, on a well-deserved award for your hard work and dedication to making Clark Parks a great success, and for looking for new ways to leverage resources and partnerships!
