Klinline Kids Fishing will be held at Salmon Creek Park / Klinline Pond. Special Needs kids will experience fishing on Friday - April 8, 2016. Kids ages 5 through 14 will fish on Saturday - April 9, 2016.

Presented by the Klinline Kids Fishing Nonprofit, the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife and Clark Public Utilities, this program is aimed at getting more kids involved in fishing and building a base for the future stewards of this resource.

Sewer Construction to start soon on Highway 99

The NE Hazel Dell business district will be getting a replacement sanitary sewer line soon. The present sewer pipe is 48 years old and has issues. The replacement plastic pipe will be 8"-10" in diameter and last 50 plus years.



Construction will take place on Hwy 99 stretching north from NE 63rd Street to NE 78th Street. Digging will be done in stages with minimal interruption to traffic and businesses. Some night construction will take place. However, there will be no

weekend construction. Only the North bound right lane and some East side sidewalks on Hwy 99 will be affected with temporary closures in work zones. The sewer project start date is May 2016 after the Hazel Dell parade and will continue through October 2016. The funding for this \$2 million investment in the sewer infrastructure comes from the District's Replacement and Restoration (R&R) account which is generated through customer rates.

Vancouver School District Officials named "LEADERS TO LEARN FROM 2016" by Education Week newspaper

America's newspaper and website of record for K-12 schools selected Vancouver, Wash., educators as two of 13 in the U.S. to recognize for leadership and innovation

Education Week named Vancouver Public Schools' Steven T. Webb, superintendent, and Thomas R. Hagley Jr., chief of staff, "Leaders to Learn From 2016." Webb and Hagley are profiled in the national report for their vision and leadership in developing Family-Community Resource Centers (FCRC) throughout the Vancouver district. <http://bit.ly/1Qf3Lg9>

The annual Leaders To Learn From report highlights forward-thinking educational leaders who seize on good ideas and execute them well in their school systems. Webb and Hagley are two of 13 honorees selected by Education Week editors from a pool of hundreds of submissions by education writers, state school administrator groups, and experts in the K-12 field.

Nominator Martin Blank, president of the Institute for Educational Leadership and director of the Coalition for Community Schools in

Washington, DC, noted Webb and Hagley as "the driving force behind a proactive, community-based approach to turning around economically disadvantaged schools."

With more than half of its 23,500 students eligible for free or reduced-price meals, a federal indicator of poverty, VPS is working with community partners to reduce barriers to learning. This challenge is compounded in 16 of the district's highest-poverty schools where achievement gaps and student mobility disproportionately affect large numbers of students.

Through the district's strategic plan, Webb and Hagley have addressed the performance discrepancy head-on by establishing a network of Family-Community Resource Centers to help meet the needs of the families and students in those 16 schools. An FCRC mobile unit was created to serve other schools. FCRC-related services have included assistance with food, clothing, medical and dental care, housing, early education, childcare, afterschool programs and parent support.

"Community schools are about the village--families, schools and communities coming together and interacting as partners to provide wrap-around support for students in need," said Webb. "We couldn't do this work without the hundreds of partners who have stepped up to help, and we're so grateful for their contributions."

Webb and Hagley's leadership and commitment to initiate and expand the community schools model has resulted in academic gains, decreased mobility and increased family engagement. The VPS graduation rate also has improved from 64 percent in 2010 to 80 percent in 2015.

Code Enforcement

Code Enforcement is a special type of law enforcement that regulates land use. The county obtains its authority to regulate land use from the police powers conferred upon it by the Washington State Constitution which permits counties to make and enforce within its limits all local, police, sanitary, and other ordinances and regulations not in conflict with general laws of the land. Unless in conflict with state law, the courts generally view land use ordinances as valid exercises of police power when reasonably related to public health, safety, and welfare. Clark County has adopted several land use ordinances to combat public nuisance including but not limited to:

- Unified Development Code (zoning ordinance)
- Public nuisance ordinance
- International building and fire codes including dangerous buildings

Our philosophy is that compliance is our primary goal and education is the key to reaching that goal. Many citizens do not realize that they are violating local ordinances. However, most people are willing to play by the rules if they know them.

Reporting a violation

When reporting a violation to Code Enforcement, be prepared to provide us with detailed information, like:

- a detailed property address of the violation
- a description of the violation
- your name and phone number


