Walk & Knock Food Drive – December 5th

The Interservice Walk & Knock Food Drive is a registered 501c (3) non-profit organization that serves Clark County by soliciting charitable donations of food, supplies and money, which in turn are given to the Clark County food banks for providing food to needy individuals within our community. The members of Walk & Knock include local Lions, Kiwanis, Rotary and Optimist clubs, members of the Clark County Amateur Radio Club, and adult leaders of Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America. Most of the needed supplies and services are donated, and advertising is paid for by corporate and private sponsors. No

public funds are used for anything other than for the purchase of food. Walk & Knock is 100% privately funded.

Walk & Knock distributes grocery bags throughout the county, and local residents fill them with food and leave them on their doorsteps the first Saturday in December. Volunteers go door-to-door to collect the bags and deliver the food to one of ten drop-off locations.

The Walk & Knock Food Drive occurs on the first Saturday of December, starting at 9 AM. This year it is December 5th.

Help Your Recycle Truck Driver Help You

Recycling does take a little effort, but following the rules below will ensure your recycle truck driver collects the most recyclables in the best possible condition and you get the best benefit for your effort.

The following explanations may help you understand the reasoning behind the rules:

⇔ Separate Your Recyclables ~

Two years ago Clark County and its cities switched from the 3-bin system to one bin for glass plus a recycling roll cart for almost all the other recyclable materials collected curbside

The new trucks have two sections; one for glass and one for most other materials. When the trucks return to the transfer station where the actual sorting is done, they deposit each category in a different location.

⇔ Place your roll cart at least three feet from other containers ~ This arrangement allows the automated truck to pick up your recycling cart without knocking over your garbage can or cart.

⇒ Plastic bags are recyclable, but NOT in your cart ~ Plastic bags tangle in the recycling sorting machinery and prohibit other more valuable commodities from being recycled. Most grocery stores have a special collection container for plastic bags near the front doors.

⇒ Set Glass Bin and Mixed Recycling Cart at the Curb by 6:30 am on Day of Pick Up ~ Our recycle truck drivers all start picking up recyclables by 6:30 am. You cannot always count on the fact that your driver usually comes by at a certain time; for any number of reasons, the schedule can change. If scavenging is not a problem you may want to set your recycling cart out the night before your pick up is scheduled.



⇒ Cut Cardboard Down to fit inside your Recycling Roll Cart ~ Cardboard is much more marketable if it is dry. If it is inside the cart, it saves time for the recycling driver and allows him to service more homes in a day, keeping costs down.

⇒ Place Used Motor Oil or Antifreeze in a clear one gallon plastic jug with a screw top lid and place near cart~ Motor Oil and Antifreeze will be picked up on a space available basis. Please use clear one-gallon plastic jugs with screw-on lids; they fit snugly in a special space on the truck so they won't spill. Also, please don't mix oil or antifreeze with water, brake fluid, or other liquids. Contaminated oil and antifreeze are not recyclable; they should be disposed of as household hazardous waste.

⇒ Place Scrap Metal (no larger than 24" and less than 35 pounds) Inside Your Recycle Cart ~ Scrap metal includes brass, aluminum, copper, and steel.

⇒ Place Household Batteries On Top of Your Blue Recycle Cart ~ Please place all household batteries, including batteries from flashlights, rechargeable appliances, hearing aids, etc. in a clear, sealed plastic bag on top of your recycle cart.

Recycling does take some work, but done properly, it has many benefits!

E-Cycle Washington, Empower Up and the ReStore

Since Jan. 1, 2010, Waste Connections has been prohibited from accepting computers, monitors, TVs and laptops as garbage. The restrictions are the result of an Oregon law banning the land filling of old electronic equipment. Because the landfill that serves Clark County is located in Oregon, the law applies indirectly here, too. However, you can still get rid of old televisions, computers and monitors for free, thanks to a Washington law requiring manufacturers to underwrite a statewide electronics recycling program.

E-Cycle Washington is a program that provides free recycling of computers (including laptop and "tablet" PCs), monitors, TVs, portable DVD players and e-readers. Peripherals and accessories such as mice, printers and scanners are NOT covered under the program, although they may be accepted by the drop off sites. Empower Up is a non-profit organization focusing on computer reuse. They accept used computers, computer parts and other consumer electronics from the public at no charge.

Empower Up prefers to accept only working equipment that is no more than 5 years old although they will accept non-working or older equipment at this time. Used computers are available for purchase in the Empower Up Thrift Store. They


are located at 5000 E Fourth Plain Blvd., Suite E101. Empower Up accepts donations from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday. For additional information, please visit www.empowerup.org/ or call 360-314-4171.

The Habitat for Humanity ReStore is a thrift store that sells donated new and used building and home improvement products. The stock is constantly changing but often includes lumber, lighting fixtures, sinks, toilets, major appliances, floor coverings and furniture. Sales from the ReStore help build homes for low income families. The Clark County ReStore recently moved to 10811 SE Mill Plain Blvd. Store hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday; donations until 4:30 p.m. For more information on the ReStore, visit www.pdxrestore.org or call 360-213-1313.

If you are looking for quality services and meaningful opportunities for persons 60 years of age or older, adults with disabilities and their families, you've come to the right place.

The Southwest Washington Agency on Aging and Disabilities (SWAAD) is the federally designated agency on aging for the five southwest

Washington counties of Clark, Cowlitz, Klickitat, Skamania, and Wahkiakum. It is one of thirteen agencies on aging in Washington State and is part of the state and national network of area agencies on aging.

By providing access to a wide range of resources, SWAAD makes it possible for older individuals, adults with disabilities and their families to choose the services and living arrangements that suit them best. To assist older persons in making informed choices and decisions, the SWAAD directly provides specialized services called Senior Information and Assistance. Senior Information & Assistance offices are located in Vancouver, Kelso, Goldendale, Stevenson, and White Salmon.

The Senior Information and Assistance Program is a free service that acts as a main access point for a wide range of public and private resources that are available to older population, adults with disabilities, and family caregivers. Our goal is to support independence, dignity, and health of seniors. This may include information giving, service referrals, advocacy, assistance and caregiver services, and screening to determine if an in-home assessment is needed. Information and assistance can be provided on the phone, in person, by email, or regular mail.

If you are a person 60 years of age or over, an adult with disabilities and/or a family caregiver, you may be eligible for a wide range of services through the Southwest Washington Agency on Aging and Disabilities.




