Question 1: Please tell us how important the following neighborhood park elements are to you.

- The least support was for the small skateboarding spot (74% selecting “Not Important”) and the basketball half court/sports court (49% selecting “Not Important”).

Question 2: Have you ever visited this property before?

Yes: 55

No: 69 (Primarily because they didn’t know it existed previously.)

If you answered “yes,” what did you do there?

- Walked through or past it
- Walked, jogged or played with dog(s)
- Picnicked
- Just looked at it from the street
- Played ball or tossed a Frisbee
- Nothing (because it’s not developed)
- Explored
- Socialized with neighbors
- Used it as a shortcut to access the golf course
- Picked blackberries
- Hiked around with children

Question 3: Is there something special about this park you would like to preserve during the upcoming development process (i.e. trees, views, access points)?

71 people responded to this question (53%).

Most of these responses were focused on preserving the natural features of the park, including:

- Trees/large mature trees
- Wildlife habitat
- Native plants

- Open lawn area(s)
- Wetland – don't allow people to walk through it without installing a bridge
- Forested area in the northeast corner
- Leave the open lawn area north of the power lines “as is”
- The natural buffer bushes next to adjacent properties

Additional features/elements respondents were interested in preserving were:

- Existing access point from NE 69th Street
- Views into golf course

Question 4: Do you have any concerns about this upcoming park development project? If so, please explain.

57 people responded to this question (43%).

Most of the concerns respondents expressed were about:

- A developed park attracting more traffic to the neighborhood and encouraging visitors to park on neighborhood streets
- The park attracting criminal activities to the neighborhood
- The park becoming a place for teenagers to gather and party after dark

Other concerns were:

- Keep it as natural as possible/don't overdevelop it.
- Don't spend taxpayer money on this project.
- Don't allow access to the park from 69th Street.
- Don't allow/encourage on-street parking on 69th Street.
- There is no easy access to park from neighborhood to the west – consider an access trail through the golf course connecting to the segment of 69th Street west of the park.
- Improve visibility through the park by removing underbrush and blackberries.
- 50 registered sex offenders live in this area – safety and security are very important.
- Provide parking inside the park, so neighborhood streets don't become congested.
- May need to include some sort of barrier against golf balls flying into the park from the adjacent golf course.
- Don't want the park. Don't build it.
- Don't want any active play features in the park (e.g. playground, sports court, etc.). Keep it passive and natural.
- Concerned that the park is somewhat secluded and has poor visibility from adjacent properties and roads.
- It is primarily used as a place for people to walk their dogs – don't want to lose this.
- Don't allow dogs off the leash in the park (Note: County code doesn't allow dogs to be off the leash in any park unless it has been designated as an official off-leash dog park).
- Need adequate parking and restrooms.
- Skateboarding and basketball will be too noisy for adjacent neighbors.
- A skateboarding feature will encourage after-hours use in the park.
- Spend the money on something else.
- Don't want children to have access to the power line towers.
- Small children will need access to a restroom.
- Don't allow after hours use (gate and lock entrances).

- This is not a good location for a public park – it is too secluded and visibility is too poor.
- Homes in this area all have large backyards – a park is not needed.
- Concerned that the development will chase away the wildlife.
- The park will need to be secured and patrolled on a regular basis.
- Concerned that the park won't be regularly maintained.
- Don't want wood chips in the playground because of splinters.
- Locate open lawn areas, playground and other active play areas away from adjacent homes to cut down on noise.
- Enforce existing leash and waste removal laws for dogs.
- Like the park the way it is now. Leave it alone.
- Build it sooner.
- Concerned about the impact to the park if BPA expands the power corridor through the park.
- Don't want outsiders coming in to the neighborhood.
- Get rid of any hiding places inside the park.
- Concerned that playground equipment will just get vandalized.
- Providing a place for people to walk their dogs will bring more visitors and better “eyes on the park.”
- Provide tall fences and buffer plantings for adjacent neighbors.
- The power lines are dangerous.

Question 5: Do you have any other comments about this project?

- Access from NE 63rd Street is vital.
- Get rid of the power lines.
- Getting this park developed was the main reason we bought our house – very excited.
- Make the NE 69th Street access secondary to the access from NE 63rd Street.
- Plant trees and other vegetation that specifically attract more wildlife to the park.
- Very excited to have a park so close to home.
- Make sure the park is safe for young children, but also interesting for older children.
- This is a great thing for local families.
- Don't want to pay more property taxes for parks.
- Looking forward to using the new park.
- Use this space for things like rummage sales, a farmer's market, educational seminar, outdoor concerns or health and fitness programs.
- Make sure the park is handicapped accessible.
- This park will be an asset to the community.
- Provide a clear demarcation of the property lines of the park (fence it).
- This park will help connect neighbors and create a better sense of community.
- Don't want the park to raise property assessments.
- Need sidewalks on the roads leading to the park.
- Need traffic warning signs about watching for pedestrians going to the park.
- Build it as soon as possible.
- Fence the park off from the golf course.
- Connect the park to the neighborhood to the west using the BPA corridor.

Regarding specific park features:

- Locate playground close to trees for shade.
- Provide an equal balance between grassy and wooded areas.
- Plant more trees for shade.
- On-street parking dedicated for the park is necessary.
- Provide more open lawn area.
- Need more than one entrance.
- Remove the blackberries and other invasive plants.
- Install a 6-foot tall fence around the entire site.
- Area set aside for playing with dogs off the leash (xx people requested this).
- Dog waste bag dispenser.
- Keep some areas natural for kids to explore.
- Include an elevated walkway or bridge across the wetland from north to south.
- Need a covered picnic shelter.
- Include a drinking fountain.
- Include restrooms.
- Include a parking lot or other dedicated parking.
- Include security lighting.
- Include BBQ grills.
- Include horseshoe pits.
- Include checkers or chess tables.
- Walking/running trail would be nice.
- Would like colorful playground equipment with long slides and lots of swings.
- Parking lot at the 63rd Street entrance is needed.
- Install surveillance cameras.
- Include a Frisbee/disc golf course.
- Include an archery practice area – local businesses could donate targets in return for advertising on them.
- Include full-court basketball.
- Include a tennis court.
- Include benches along the walking trail, so elderly users have a place to stop and rest.
- Include playground equipment and picnic tables.
- Put covered picnic tables and open lawn play area next to the playground.
- Include a baseball backstop.
- Include a cat park.
- Provide wide walking trails.
- Make it like Whale Park in Kona, Hawaii.
- Build a playground close to the 69th Street entrance.
- Include a volleyball area.
- Include a pickleball court.
- Include exercise stations that are easy to maintain.
