Description of Proposal: *Amend Comprehensive Plan to remove Urban Holding Overlay near the I-5/179th St. Interchange, CPZ2019-00023 (Hinton), Phase III*

Proponent: *Clark County Community Planning*

The lead agency for this proposal has determined that it does not have a probable significant adverse impact on the environment. In 2007, the Vancouver Urban Growth Area was expanded to include the properties affected in this proposal. An Environmental Impact Analysis was completed in 2007 that was associated with this urban land. In 2016 a supplemental Environmental Impact Statement was completed in association with the 2016 Comprehensive Plan update. A new environmental impact statement (EIS) is not required under RCW 43.21C.030(2)(c). This decision was made after review of a completed environmental checklist and other information on file with the lead agency. This information is available to the public on request.

The proposed comprehensive plan map amendment will occur on one property (APN 181675000). The Planning Commission hearing is scheduled for July 18th. Clark County Council hearing has not been scheduled.
7. Do you have any plans for future additions, expansion, or further activity related to or connected with this proposal? If yes, explain.
Yes. The removal of the Urban Holding Overlay is a result of the execution of a development agreement that helps fund critical infrastructure. Additional development agreements in the vicinity may be executed to fund additional corridor improvements that are necessary for removing additional urban holding overlays.
8. List any environmental information you know about that has been prepared, or will be prepared, directly related to this proposal.

In 2007, the Vancouver Urban Growth Area was expanded to include the properties affected in this proposal. The properties were assigned urban zoning and comprehensive plan designations, but the urban holding overlays were placed on the land because of the lack of urban services. An Environmental Impact Analysis was completed in 2007 that was associated with this urban land. In 2016 a supplemental Environmental Impact Statement was completed in association with the 2016 Comprehensive Plan update.

A development agreement associated with the one property (181675000) will be required to be approved concurrently with this comprehensive map amendment.

Clark County Council approval of a development agreement associated with one property (181675000) will be required to be approved concurrently with this comprehensive map amendment.

The proposal will remove the comprehensive plan and zoning urban holding overlay. The proposed comprehensive plan map amendment will occur on one property (181675000). This property is designated with Single Family Residential Land Use and Zoning. The approximate area of the proposal is 32.45 acres.
