Background

- The Clark County Parks Division was created in 2014 after the County elected not to renew its Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the City of Vancouver.
- The Clark County Parks Advisory Board was created in August, 2014.
- In September 2015, the County adopted the Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Plan primarily to allow the County Parks Division to be eligible for state grant funding.

Background Continued

- The state Growth Management Act grants cities and counties the authority to assess park impact fees on new development.
- In 2016, the County approved an update to the Parks Impact Fee (PIF) program to reflect current costs for land and park development
- This was the first update to PIF since 2003.

Background Continued

- At the direction of the County Council, staff initiated a review of the PIF program to include trail projects going forward.
- State statute and County code are silent on the usage of impact fees for trails.
- Clark County has maintained a programmatic application of impact fees for urban area parks and open space – Title 40 more narrowly defines PIF than that which may be allowed.
- Discussions for the usage of impact fees to support trails date back to the late 1990s.


Parks Impact Fees and Clark County Title 40 Code Requirements

Per the Unified Development Code Title 40.620.020, the following is the formula for calculation of the PIF:

PIF = (Acquisition Cost + Development Cost) - Cost Adjustment Factor

- The only recommended change is a modification to the formula to accommodate trail-related capital projects.
- The Parks boundaries will remain the same, but may be revisited at a later time.

Park Impact Fee Districts



- Clark County's Title 40 repeats, verbatim, the definitions for 'public facilities' and 'system improvements' from the RCWs for its local impact fee ordinance.
- Public facilities include "parks, open space and recreation facilities"
- The common, industry interpretation would include trails as recreation facilities.
- Numerous municipalities across the state incorporate trails as a recreation facility in their planning and impact fees

- Current county plans contain goals, policies and supporting documentation regarding planned or recommended capital improvements to enhance and expand the recreational trail system
 - Comprehensive Plan
 - Parks, Recreation and Open Space Plan
 - Trails & Bikeway System Plan
 - Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan
 - Parks Capital Facilities Plan

Text Edit:

 The impact fee component for parks, open space and recreational facilities, which include the acquisition or development of public open spaces devoted to public parks, playgrounds, and trails and other recreational purposes, shall be calculated using the following formula

Formula Modification

PIF = (Acquisition Cost + Development Cost + Trail Cost) - Cost
Adjustment Factor

Inclusion of trail costs based on previously adopted Parks
Capital Facilities Plan and population growth forecasts

PIF Rate Recommendation from Staff

- In 2016, the County Council adopted PIF rates as a stepped/phased increase over time.
- The rate increase was based on an 80% of the full, rate in year one, a 90% rate in year two, and the full rate in year three.
- For 2018, the County has implemented the second of the three stepped increases.
