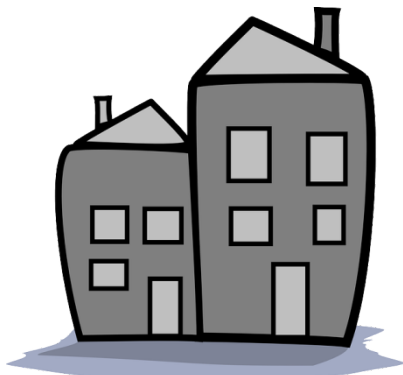

311 for Non-Emergency Law Enforcement

Clark Regional Emergency Services Agency (CRESA) is excited to announce a new number for the community to use to report non-emergency law enforcement issues.

Historically, Clark County has had one number to call to connect with their local law enforcement. This meant that if you had a non-emergency complaint (like someone had stolen your bicycle overnight) you had no choice but to call 911 to report the crime. Beginning in October community members can call 311 or 360-693-3111 to reach the 911 dispatchers. Using this line will help prioritize incoming calls at the 911 center and keep 911 open for emergencies.

When you call 311 you may be placed on hold or you may be placed in a queue. You may hear a recorded message with information about alternative numbers or resources you may use instead of waiting for a dispatcher. CRESA is a busy place, serving as both the 911 answering point for all of incorporated and unincorporated Clark County and is also the dispatch center for local law enforcement and fire/EMS responders. Please be patient, as the same people answering 911 emergency calls and dispatching responders are the same people answering 311. If all dispatchers on duty are responding to 911 calls the 311 line may not be answered immediately.

A few guidelines to follow when you decide if you want to call 911 versus 311:

- Always use 911 for any fire and medical call, no matter how minor you think the medical complaint is
- Call 911 if your police complaints involves a gun, is a crime happening now, or a situation that needs police to prevent or stop an injury or property damage
- 311 is the alternative number to report non-emergency law enforcement related complaints

If you are unsure, call 911 and we will get you the right help or refer you to the right resource. Visit www.cresa911.org for more information.

Clark County Fire District 6 invites public to meetings on levy lid lift

Clark County Fire District 6 is asking voters to approve a levy lid lift of 23 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value on the Nov. 3 General Election ballot. The purpose of the lid lift is to meet the growing emergency service needs of the community.

Emergency personnel are responding to a higher number of calls as call volumes have skyrocketed over the past 10 years by 31 percent. In the past year alone, calls have increased by 10 percent. More emergency calls mean higher costs, and the current levy rate is insufficient to meet the service level requirements of the community.

Fire officials are inviting community members to attend an hour-long meeting to learn about the challenges facing the district and ask questions about the lid lift.

The meetings are scheduled for:

- **Monday, Oct. 19 at 6:30 p.m. (One hour before the regular meeting of the Board of Fire Commissioners.)**
- **Saturday, Oct. 24 at 9:00 a.m.**
- **Thursday, Oct. 29 at noon**

All meetings will be held at Fire District Headquarters at 8800 NE Hazel Dell Ave., Vancouver, WA, 98665. Refreshments will be provided. The lid lift would cost an additional \$4.79 per month (or \$57.50 per year) for the average homeowner. It would pay for daily operations, firefighter training and to replace aging apparatus and fire stations. More information about the lid lift can be found at www.ccf6d.org.

The fire district has responded to the current funding shortfall by cutting expenses almost \$400,000, postponing

apparatus and facility replacements and drawing down reserve funds by \$1.5 million. As a result, emergency response vehicles are breaking down more often and one of the district's fire stations is operating past its usable life and needs to be replaced.



The fire district also was downgraded by the Washington Surveying and Rating Bureau because the right facilities and firefighting training programs are not in place to serve the community. If this trend continues, it could cause insurance rates to increase as much as three percent for homeowners and nine percent for businesses.

How to recycle Film Plastics!

In an effort to recycle as much as possible, many people mistakenly put their plastic bags in their recycling carts. Unfortunately, plastic bags and other types of film plastics do more harm than good when disposed of in this way.



Plastic bags, shrink wrap, bubble wrap and other types of "stretchy" film plastic easily tangle in the machinery that is meant to sort recyclables into separate categories. This slows efficiency of the facility, as the machines have to be shut down to allow workmen to climb in and cut out the bags with box cutters. This material accounts for at least a 25% reduction in efficiency.

So what should I do with them?

First and foremost, try to eliminate plastic film from your life as much as possible by taking your own reusable

bags to the grocery store, reusing bubble wrap, and trying to reduce the amount of plastic film you buy in general.

Reuse and Recycling:

Plastic bags can be reused in your home (e.g. as waste basket liners or doggy poo scooper bags.) Any bags you don't reuse can be properly recycled by placing them in the receptacles found near the front of most grocery stores.

This ensures they will be recycled with other materials of the same kind and not have a chance to choke recycling sorting machinery.

Make a Difference Day Event – October 24th

Make A Difference Day on Oct. 24 will marshal volunteers to pick up cigarette butts.

Clark County is preparing for the next major event, Make A Difference Day, on Saturday, Oct. 24. Volunteers will participate in the community's fifth annual "The Butt Stops Here" cleanup to remove cigarette butts and other litter from parks.

Cigarette and tobacco debris account for an estimated 32 percent of litter in parks and recreation areas. Cigarette butts contain chemicals that are carried by polluted storm runoff into streams, rivers and wetlands, where they can harm fish and other aquatic life.

During the past four Make a Difference Day events, volunteers collected 81 pounds of cigarette butts and 53 bags of litter from parks and other public places.

"We're hoping for another strong turnout from our dedicated volunteers," said Karen Llewellyn, volunteer program coordinator for Public Works. "We had 260 volunteers participate in our successful Day of Service earlier this month."

Clark County Parks hosted nine events across the county on Sept. 12. The events were held in connection with the September 11th National Day of Service and Remembrance, which honors the almost 3,000 people killed during the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

Some of the larger events included:

- Camp Hope – 70 volunteers cleared vegetation and performed other work at the educational youth camp near Lewisville Regional Park north of Battle Ground.
- Vancouver Lake Regional Park – 47 volunteers removed about 60 bags of litter from the park and other areas near the lake and flushing channel.

- Pacific Community Park – 40 volunteers pulled weeds and planted new ground cover in the park's demonstration gardens, which showcase environmentally friendly yard and garden techniques.

- Lucia Falls Regional Park – 30 volunteers removed 12 cubic yards of English ivy from the park on the East Fork of the Lewis River.

In addition, volunteers participating in Clark County's Adopt-A-Road Program collected 63 bags of litter from four road sections on Sept. 12:

- Northwest 119th Street, Northwest Lakeshore Avenue to Northwest Seventh Avenue.

- Northeast Minnehaha Street, Northeast St. Johns Road to Northeast Andresen Road.

- Highway 99, Northeast 99th Street to Northeast 119th Street.

- Highway 99, Northeast 119th Street to Northeast 134th Street.

On Friday, October 30, Vancouver Public Schools Superintendent Steve Webb will host his first patron tour of the 2015–2016 school year. The tour will provide an in-depth look at the dynamic learning opportunities at Marshall and Walnut Grove elementary schools.

Both schools will showcase applications of the district's strategic plan, Design II, and commitment to preparing students for college, careers and life. The tour of Marshall Elementary School will highlight its new Family-Community Resource Center, unique community partnerships, the Advancement Via Individual Determination program for third- through fifth-graders and an early childhood learning program.

At Walnut Grove, visitors will visit an Imagine Learning Lab that supports language acquisition for English language learners and a full-day kindergarten classroom. Visitors also will learn how an elementary school creates a culture of respect and caring by establishing clear behavioral expectations and building positive relationships among the students and staff.

The free tour will begin and end at the Bates Center for Educational Leadership, 2921 Falk Rd. The tour starts at 8:30 a.m. and concludes at 1 p.m. After visiting Marshall and Walnut Grove, guests have the option of enjoying a student musical performance and a delicious lunch prepared by culinary arts students. 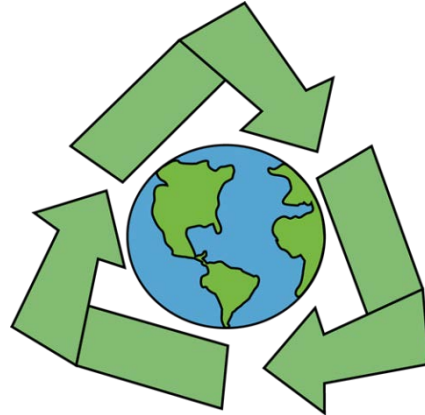
Recycling Hints

Plastic bags or wrappers do NOT belong in the blue recycle roll carts. Neither do veggie trays or lids, plastic bubble packaging, or just about anything which is plastic (other than plastic bottles with a neck and cottage cheese/yogurt tubs). Plastic bags get caught in the sorting machine forcing it to be stopped and the plastic bags removed. This costs YOU money!

Please don't put your plastic bags in the blue roll cart.

Frozen food packaging does NOT belong in the blue recycle roll carts either.

Boxes for frozen or refrigerated foods are treated with a chemical named 'wet strength' which keeps the cardboard from disintegrating when it gets wet. That chemical makes the cardboard extremely difficult to recycle, so put cold food packaging in the gray garbage roll cart.



Additionally Styrofoam (™) packaging and food containers do NOT belong in the blue recycle roll carts. Kleenex and paper towels do NOT belong there either.

What DOES belong in the blue roll cart?

Paper egg cartons, newspapers, aluminum cans, catalogues, junk mail, rinsed food cans, cardboard, plastic containers with a neck (please remove the lid and squish), magazines, phone books, paper bags, cereal boxes, milk cartons, empty aerosol cans (please remove the plastic nozzle), scrap metal, etc.

Glass goes in the old bin we used to use - the green one if you have a choice, but the brown or cream one is ok too.

Shredded paper can be put in the blue recycle roll cart but please first put it in a paper bag and staple the bag shut so the little fru-frus of paper don't escape.

You do not HAVE to set out your cart every service day-you may prefer to set it out only when it is full or mostly full.
