

The 2017 Clark County Noxious Weed List

This document lists weed species with specifically defined control locations or requirements as assigned by the Clark County Noxious Weed Control Board.

During the February 13, 2017 meeting of the Clark County Noxious Weed Control Board (Weed Board), the 2017 Clark County Noxious Weed List was approved, which includes adoption of all Class A and Class B Designates on the Washington State Noxious Weed List and the following Class C weeds:

- 1) The Weed Board has decided the following weed species will remain categorized as Class C, Regulated – Designated for Control in Clark County, with specific language that they must be controlled on parcels that are neighbors to agricultural lands. These weeds were previously designated as such; the February 13, 2017 action clarified the locations where the weeds must be controlled. To define, neighboring lands are those immediately adjacent to agricultural lands, those immediately opposite a right-of-way that is bordering the agricultural land, and the right-of-way itself. The specific weeds are:
 - a) Bull thistle
 - b) Canada thistle

- 2) The following weed species, listed as Class C by the State, are now designated by the Weed Board as Class C, Regulated – Designated for Control in Clark County:
 - a) Absinth wormwood
 - b) Babysbreath
 - c) Black henbane
 - d) Hairy whitetop
 - e) Hoary cress
 - f) Medusahead
 - g) Russian olive
 - h) Spikeweed
 - i) Yellowflag iris

- 3) All other weed species listed by the State as Class C are not adopted into the Clark County list. Their control will not be required. However, education may be provided by Field Inspectors.
