NOTE TO VOTERS

This sample ballot contains all candidates who have filed for office and will appear in the General election on November 2. You will **not** be entitled to vote on all races and issues that appear on this sample ballot. When you vote only the candidates and measures that apply to your precinct will be listed on your ballot.

Ballot deposit locations are open from 7 AM to 8 PM, election day only.

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MAKE SURE YOUR VOTE COUNTS.

Before you begin voting, please take the time to read through all of the voting instructions printed on the ballot you receive and the instructions printed on the other materials included in your ballot packet. By understanding the voting instructions thoroughly you will make sure your vote counts.

Voting Instructions:

- 1) Your ballot must be voted in secret and shown to no one.
- 2) Use a black or blue ink pen to mark your ballot by completely filling in the box to the left of your choice(s).
- 3) Vote for only one choice for each office or ballot measure. Unless specifically allowed by law, more than one vote for an office or ballot measure will be an overvote and no votes for that office or ballot measure will be counted.
- 4) To vote for a person not appearing on the ballot, completely fill in the box to the left of the "Write-in" choice and use the line provided for their name.
- 5) If you make a mistake when voting, completely cross out the name of the candidate or choice you do not want. You then have the option of making another choice.

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 1053

Proposed by Initiative Petition

Initiative Measure No. 1053 concerns tax and fee increases imposed by state government.

This measure would restate existing statutory requirements that legislative actions raising taxes must be approved by two-thirds legislative majorities or receive voter approval, and that new or increased fees require majority legislative approval.

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 1082

Proposed by Initiative Petition

Initiative Measure No. 1082 concerns industrial insurance.

This measure would authorize employers to purchase private industrial insurance beginning July 1, 2012; direct the legislature to enact conforming legislation by March 1, 2012; and eliminate the worker-paid share of medical-benefit premiums.

INITIATIVE MEASURE NO. 1098

Proposed by Initiative Petition

Initiative Measure No. 1098 concerns establishing a state income tax and reducing other taxes.

This measure would tax "adjusted gross income" above \$200,000 (individuals) and \$400,000 (joint-filers), reduce state property tax levies, reduce certain business and occupation taxes, and direct any increased revenues to education and health.

Proposed by Initiative Petition

Initiative Measure No. 1100 concerns liquor (beer, wine and spirits).

This measure would close state liquor stores; authorize sale, distribution, and importation of spirits by private parties; and repeal certain requirements that govern the business operations of beer and wine distributors and producers.

Initiative Measure No. 1105 concerns liquor (beer, wine and spirits).

REFERENDUM BILL NO. 52

Proposed to the People by the Legislature

The legislature has passed Engrossed House Bill No. 2561, concerning authorizing and funding bonds for energy efficiency projects in schools.

This bill would authorize bonds to finance construction and repair projects increasing energy efficiency in public schools and higher education buildings, and continue the sales tax on bottled water otherwise expiring in 2013.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8225

Proposed to the People by the Legislature -
Amendment to the State Constitution

The legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment concerning the limitation on state debt.

This amendment would require the state to reduce the interest accounted for in calculating the constitutional debt limit, by the amount of federal payments scheduled to be received to offset that interest.

ENGROSSED SUBSTITUTE HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4220

Proposed to the People by the Legislature -
Amendment to the State Constitution

The legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment on denying bail for persons charged with certain criminal offenses.

This amendment would authorize courts to deny bail for offenses punishable by the possibility of life in prison, on clear and convincing evidence of a propensity for violence that would likely endanger persons.
