Meeting called to order by Jerry Kolke at 9:06 a.m.

- 1. Review and Approval of meeting minutes from July 2nd, 2018 meeting (Jerry)
 - Motion moved by Bill, seconded by Randy; Approved
- 2. Introduction of Justin Collell, Interim Coordinator, and Chris Walker, Office Assistant in Vegetation Management (Justin)
- 3. Weed Board Member Applications for Districts 1 and 5 (Jerry)
 - Motion moved to accept Randy Lawffer and Lee Wells member applications by Bill, seconded by Jerry; Approved – Kevin Tyler will prepare staff report requesting council to re-appoint
- 4. Civil Infractions (Justin)
 - Timothy Brown Penalty reduced and paid
 - Michael Defrees Civil Infraction unpaid file intent to lien
 - Mark Burton file Claim of Lien

Jack Ellis – Appealed \$750 Civil Infraction for Bighead Knapweed

- Mr. Ellis stated he is following a deadhead program (every Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday) and has seven 5 gallon buckets of deadheads
- II. Mr. Ellis will spray in the Spring and Fall and is committed to controlling the weeds for as long as he lives on the property
- Motion moved to waive fine by Lee, seconded by Bill; Approved Mr. Ellis was
 informed that if he fails to control the weeds he will receive the maximum fine of
 \$1,000.





5. Updates on select weeds (Justin)

Class A

- i. Garlic Mustard Fall treatments completed County-Wide, also treated City of Camas
- ii. Oblong/Eggleaf Spurge Fewer sites than originally noted Seven sites were Petty Spurge which is not listed Waiting until later in the season to identify as Petty Spurge blooms much earlier and is smaller Oblong Spurge takes longer to flower and is yellow at the top

Class B

- i. Wild Chervil Fall Treatments complete
- ii. Japanese Knotweed Grant Targeted North Fork of Lewis River due to large infestation (approximately two acres)
- iii. Tansy Ragwort No civil infractions as homeowners are keeping up with control signs seemed to help, although some signs had the date changed or smudged out

Class C

 Longspine sandbur - New infestation found in Clark County - Sample brought in showing bur - likes sandy soil and has been found at Frenchman's Bar along the water at the southern tip of the park -Small infestations may be pulled using good gloves

Control Program for Landowners

- Program is going well and is of no cost to the landowner
- Hold Harmless agreement signed by landowner limits liability/damage to Clark County – does not protect Clark County if control methods kill arborvitae, grapes, etc. – agreement is good for one year and then landowner will take over – Suggested we give references for spray businesses
- Control dictated by location Usual hold harmless control takes about ½ hour - if some locations are steep or difficult the landowner will be responsible due to department time constraints
- Need to evaluate program and determine if we have resources
- Control for City of Camas (Lee Wells requested information)
 - Vegetation Management bills City of Camas for control work
 - Funds from City of Camas go into General Fund and do not fund weed board efforts
 - How can the funds be dedicated back to the weed board?
 - a. Vegetation Management would need to set up their own fund
 - **b.** Would budget office support this?





Update requests from Weed Board

- Bill requested we be selective on what we control due to budget
- Lee asked for an update on chemical cost for Vegetation Management and where we source chemicals
 - a. Denielle spends approximately 100k/year on herbicide (this is for the Noxious Weed Control Services Program and Field Inspector Program
 - **b.** Herbicide is purchased from vendors using the Washington State Contract (Wilbur-Ellis, Helena Chemical and CPS)
 - c. Vendor is selected based on quantity and cost
 - d. Herbicide is received and stored at 78th St
 - **e.** Bill mentioned Round-Up Pro is cheaper than knock-off brands landowners are getting poor results from knock-offs
 - f. Lee mentioned some individuals believe Round-Up is carcinogenic and Kevin said there was a recent court case and he has had several requests for information – OSU extension has a link with compiled data regarding roundup

6. State Weed Board changes to weed list for Clark County (Justin)

- Nonnative hawkweed undesignate
- Meadow knapweed undesignate
- Spotted knapweed undesignate

Board members will not make recommendations to State Weed Board – They will see what the outcome is and then make decisions for Clark County

7. FIP Position requested by Weed Board (Justin)

- County Manager is <u>not</u> recommending this position
- 2019 Budget Hearings (public testimony)
 - I. Tuesday, December 4th, 6pm
 - II. Wednesday, December 5th, 10am if continued from Dec 4th
- Lee suggested the Weed Board have representation all should attend with a designated speaker
