I explained that the Council could appoint her as a member and she could serve on an interim basis to see if this was something she would be interested in continuing. I am glad to inform our neighbors that Jill has decided to serve on the TNA Council and is therefore presented to you for a formal vote.

Proposed changes to the Truman Neighborhood Association Bylaws

To be voted upon at the October 26, 2023 TNA general membership meeting. Strike through indicates removal of wording

Article 10 – Elections

Current Section:

Section 3. Voting Privileges: One vote shall be allowed for each member. Proxy votes are not allowed. Members shall be required to show proof of residency in the Truman Neighborhood to be eligible to vote in Association elections.

Proposed Amendment:

Section 3. Voting Privileges: One vote shall be allowed for each member. Proxy votes are not allowed. Members shall be required to show proof of residency in the Truman Neighborhood to be eligible to vote in Association elections.

Current Section:

Section 4. Voting: To be by written ballot or comparable electronic alternative. An affirmative vote on ballots cast by a majority of those members in attendance at an Association meeting shall be required for election.

Proposed Amendment:

Section 4. Voting: To be by written ballot or comparable electronic alternative. An affirmative vote on ballots cast by a majority of those members in attendance at an Association meeting shall be required for election. Will be by voice or by raised hand by members present, whether attending in person or via the use of communication technology.

Reason for these Changes:

Due to the fact that we are now having hybrid TNA membership meetings, checking & verifying addresses and using ballots is not a feasible process. Voting by voice or by raised hands was our practice in the past and will serve us well now.



Kicking Off Our 8th Annual Truman Neighborhood Helping Hands Event

For this event, our neighborhood comes together to help purchase new, warm, and much needed clothing for children in need at Truman Elementary. We receive a list from Michelle Ames, the Family Community Resource Coordinator at Truman Elementary, with recommendations from teachers who see these children every day. This list only has the gender, age and sizes for those children, along with articles of clothing needed. We provide: shirts, pants, socks, shoes, underwear and coats. We do not purchase toys. Our goal is to cover the basic needs of these children. In the past, through the generosity of Truman Neighbors, we have been able to provide for 8 to 10 kids, with an average cost of \$82-\$85 per child.

From there we take this list and our volunteers go shopping!

Our Donation Ornament will be out at our TNA General Meeting on Thursday, Oct. 26th if you would like to contribute there. After shopping, the clothing is wrapped in tissue paper and placed in large gift bags then delivered to Michelle Ames at Truman Elementary. She then distributes the gift bags to the families the week before the school's winter break. Each bag has a gift receipt attached, so that if an item does not fit, it can be exchanged for the correct size.

What is Secure Firearm Storage?

The last 10 years of my career I ran the Victim Impact program of the Clark County Juvenile Court supporting victims and families in their recovery from juvenile crime.

Some of the most tragic cases I dealt with were the accidental shooting of children due to unsecured weapons in the home. Children accidently shot themselves, siblings or friends. These tragic injuries and deaths were preventable if the weapons had been properly secured in the home.

Contrary to popular beliefs children who participate in gun safety programs often ignore what they learned when encountering a real firearm, according to a Rutgers School of Nursing study.


Children who participate in gun safety programs often ignore what they learned when encountering a real firearm, according to a Rutgers School of Nursing study.

Among the findings from studies is that 85 percent of gun-owning parents did not practice safe gun storage and 72 percent believed their young children could differentiate a toy gun from a real gun.

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) concludes that the absence of guns from homes is the most reliable and effective measure to prevent suicide, homicide, and unintentional firearm-related injuries to children and adolescents.

But if there are guns in the home, AAP notes that storing guns unloaded and locked, with ammunition kept in a separate place, can mitigate the risk of child firearm injury. 1/3 of youth suicides and unintentional deaths are prevented by securing guns.

Washington is one of 26 states that have child-access and/or secure storage laws. In WA State the current law HB 1143 requires a 10-day waiting period and proof of completed safety training for all firearm purchases.

Drive-Thru Drug Take-Back

October 28, 2023 10 am - 2 pm

Bring any unused medication for safe, free disposal at these drive-thru Drug Take Back Event sites in Clark County:

- Any prescription and over-the-counter medication including pills, liquids & inhalers will be accepted for safe, FREE disposal.
- Medications may remain in original containers and labels do not need to be removed.
 Medications not in original containers will be accepted too.
- Vaping devices & e-Cigarettes WITHOUT Batteries will also be accepted for free disposal at all event sites EXCEPT Cowlitz Indian Tribal Public Safety Department.
- Sharps and syringes will be accepted from noncommercial sources ONLY at the PeaceHealth SW Urgent Care event site. Use an approved Sharps container when transporting; if one is not available, use a rigid plastic container with a lid (ex: plastic milk jug) & label the container: WARNING-SHARPS DO NOT RECYCLE
- NO prefilled syringes will be accepted for disposal at any event site.
- For everyone's safety, participants will remain in vehicles & use a drive-thru process to dispose of unwanted & expired medications.

Law Enforcement Warn of Increased Kia and Hyundai Thefts

The Vancouver Police Department and the Clark County Sheriff's Office have seen recent spikes in the thefts of Kias and Hyundais over the past several weeks. Most of the suspects are juveniles and several witnesses to the car thefts have been threatened with violence by the suspects. Several firearms that were inside vehicles at the time of the thefts were also stolen.

This national trend affects multiple models of both Kias and Hyundais built between 2011-2021. Law enforcement is encouraging anyone with one of the make/ models above to check with their local Kia or Hyundai dealer to see if their vehicle is eligible for a manufacturer security software update; consider using a steering wheel lock device; park in well-lit areas, preferably with visible security cameras; consider putting a tracking device in the vehicle; consider installing an alarm system. Also, please do not leave firearms or other valuables inside your vehicle .



Free Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

HHW drop-off is only available to Clark County residents. All HHW drop-offs require the visitor to fill out a short form (name, address, and signature verifying the waste is not generated by a business).

There is no cost. HHW drop-offs are limited to 25 gallons or 200 pounds.

Waste Accepted at HHW Facilities:

- Aerosols
- Antifreeze*
- Chemical fertilizers
- Fire extinguishers*
- Lead-acid vehicle batteries*
- Motor oil*
- Non-controlled medications
- Paints, inks, stains, primers
- Solvents, thinners, paint strippers

- Adhesives, glues, caulk, epoxy resins, sealants
- Batteries (single-use/alkaline/rechargeable/lithium ion)
- Cleaners, bleach, degreasers, polishes, waxes
- E-cigarette/vaping devices and nicotine liquids
- Fuel, gasoline, propane, white gas, lighter fluid, diesel oil
- Medical sharps* (in a puncture-proof container)
- Mercury-containing: lights*, thermostats, thermometers
- Pesticides, insecticides, fungicides, herbicides

* This item can be accepted during ALL hours of operation of the transfer stations, not just HHW Facility hours.

CURBSIDE RECYCLE BIN REMINDERS

Paper: Should be larger than a postcard and clean. Food soiled paper like paper plates and the bottoms of pizza boxes are *not* recyclable.

- Things like egg cartons, newspaper, cereal boxes, and paper milk cartons are recyclable.
- Frozen food packaging, paper cups, and shredded paper are not recyclable.

Metal: Should be larger than your fist and clean. Loose lids and scrap metal are not recyclable curbside.

• Aluminum cans, clean food cans, and empty aerosol cans are recyclable.

• Lids and bottle caps, scrap metal, and electronics are not recyclable curbside. (Lids and bottle caps can be placed inside a larger metal can and recycled that way, just crimp the can closed so that the lids can't slide out and you're good to go.)

Plastic: *Ignore the numbers!* Recycle plastic based on size and shape. It should be clean, larger than your fist and be in the shape of a bottle, jug, jar or tub.

- Don't crush your plastic, it should maintain its basic shape when it goes into your cart.
- For plastic lids or bottle caps: if it screws on keep the lid on when recycling, if it clicks on take the lid off and throw it away.

• Any plastic bags or film are not recyclable curbside and can be thrown away. The same applies for any plastic that does not fall into the category of a bottle, jug, jar or tub.



Since 2002, families in Clark County have met for an early morning run before gathering around their Thanksgiving table. 
DEFROST YOUR WINDSHIELD IN SECONDS
